Paragraph C**

"TO PROVIDE FOR THE MORAL AND FINANCIAL SUPPORT OF SWISS CITIZENS LIVING IN NEW ZEALAND IN URGENT AND DESERVING CASES, IN PARTICULAR TO CARE OR PROVIDE FOR THE NEEDY FAMILIES OF LIVING OR DECEASED SWISS CITIZENS, PROVIDE A DECENT BURIAL AND RESTING PLACE FOR THOSE WHO DIED WITHOUT ADEQUATE MEANS, AND GENERALLY PROVIDE FINANCIAL,

MORAL OR SOCIAL ASSISTANCE IN ANY CASE IN WHICH THE COMMITTEE THINKS FIT, BUT SO THAT NO PERSON CONSIDERED BY THE COMMITTEE AND IN THE EYES OF THE LAW OF NEW ZEALAND OR SWITZERLAND TO BE OF BAD REPUTATION OR AVERSE TO HONEST WORK SHALL RECEIVE ANY ASSISTANCE FROM THE SOCIETY."

Twenty-five years ago in the Spirit of Ruetli and Sempach a handful of Swiss joined together and founded the Swiss Benevolent Society. The above was the principal rule they laid down and when the Swiss Society took over and altered the rules in order to give it more scope it was adopted in full.
