### President's Report, 1958

Dear Compatriots,

On the end of every year one is looking back and is having a review of the successes and failures of the past year. On the success ledger we can record two outstanding events: The formation of a Swiss Club in Wellington as a branch of our Society and of equal importance is the joining of the Auckland Club as a branch also. I must not miss expressing, in this place, my highest admiration and sincerest thanks to all those who helped to bring about this important step forward. On the bad side of the ledger, however, we have lost some valued members who have passed away, amongst them a worthy foundation member, Mr. John Steiner from Auckland. As far as helping needy cases of Swiss people we were very lucky, we had to assist an old friend to a minor extent only.

Referring to the improved financial position of the Society, this is no doubt to be credited to our retiring Treasurer, Mr. A. Loetscher. It was he who tackled the situation in a business-like manner and achieved very worthwhile results. To the Secretary, Mr. A. Biland, must go the credit for the successful re-organisation of the Helvetia. I must bow to his outstanding abilities. To the rest of the committee I wish to express my thanks for the willing co-operation and help whenever I wanted it.

Looking into the future I sincerely hope that in due time every Swiss in New Zealand belongs to our Society: "A United Folk of Brethren," using Schillers words. For the future tasks of the Society I have given it a lot of thought during the last few months and I came to the conclusion that, provided we can raise the money, that our own old people's home, coupled perhaps with a home for short periods for new arrivals would be a fitting monument to our aims.

## Obituary

MR. EMIL SATTLER.—Died in Morrinsville on the 30th April last. He came to New Zealand in 1912, originating from Baar Ct. Zug. Mr. Sattler is the 4th of 5 emigrating brothers who passed away, survived only by brother Hans. He also is the third Baarer who died within the last six months. Mrs. Sattler, nee Miss Rosa Schmiediger came to New Zealand in July 1914 and they married in the following September. The marriage was a very happy one, blessed with 2 sons and 3 daughters. —W.R.

MR. FRANZ AUGUST WYSS.—Died (aged 82) at Hawera on May 6th last. Mr. Wyss arrived in New Zealand from the Ct. Zug in 1903. He took

up farming in Manaia and went home for a holiday trip to Switzerland in 1914 where he then married and arrived back in New Zealand in 1922. From the marriage there were two sons, Mr. Charles Wyss (Inaha) and Mr. August Wyss (Ngaere). Mrs. Wyss died 8 years ago. —J.St.

## QUESTION AND ANSWER COLUMN

My answer to the question in last month's issue was not quite clear enough and as it is rather important, I wish to repeat and enlarge on it.

### Question:

I am told that if I marry a New Zealander, or any other man of a different nationality, I can still keep my Swiss Citizenship. Is this correct?

### Answer:

YES — if BEFORE your marriage you make a formal declaration stating your wish to retain your Swiss Nationality. (Schweizerbuergerrecht) This declaration must be made in writing to the Swiss Authorities wherever you may be. Here in New Zealand therefore to our Swiss Consulate in Wellington who will supply the necessary forms on application. —A.B.
