NEWS FROM QUEENSTOWN

Cook and Southern Lakes Tourist Company as chief ski instructor on Coronet Peak. This is his fifth consecutive season on Coronet Peak. Otto arrived late on a Friday evening and was up on the mountain the next morning to give instructions to some enthusiastic early skiers. About a week later Karl Lauener, also from Wengen, and Fritz Burgi, from Pontresina, arrived to start immediately as assistant ski instructors.


The conditions on Coronet Peak are already excellent and on 22nd June the first competitive race for the season, the Triangular Contest, was held. This is a team competition between the Otago, Southland and Wakatipu ski clubs and is held in the form of a Giant Slalom. This year's winner of the contest was the Southland Ski Club. In the evening a social gathering took place in the supper

room of the Queenstown Memorial Hall and almost 100 skiers were present and enjoyed a pleasant evening talking, dancing, eating, drinking and singing. One of the only two local Swiss chaps, Bernie Graf, prepared a firey "Gluehwein," which was well received by one and all.
