

SWISS PRODUCTS ON DISPLAY AT N.Z. TRADE FAIR

Switzerland will be represented at the New Zealand International Trade Fair '67, to be held in Wellington between August 17th and September 2nd, 1967. The Swiss Court is occupying 1600 sq. ft. of floor area in the lower level of the Wellington Show Building. The displayed goods will show to the public some outstanding items reflecting the best Swiss products. Ten different makes of the most finest Swiss watches will be displayed with a total value exceeding \$16,000. Other products of the worldfamous Swiss precision Industry will include an automatic precision lathe, an injection moulding machine, movie cameras and projectors, sewing machines and electrostatic spraypainting equipment. The Swiss Textile Industry is well represented and will display some of the latest creations in fabrics, both cotton and silk, plus a most attractive selection of printed handkerchiefs. A special attraction will be the Swiss Tourist Stand where a projection of coloured Swiss scenery films will invite the public to stay in Switzerland during their next trip through the continent.

August 29th has been set aside as Swiss National Day, and on this occasion some special movies will be shown in the Show Building Theatrette. The Swiss Court will be attended by a charming Hostess (Miss Gaby Mueller), dressed in National costume (kindly lent for this occasion by one of our Swiss compatriots in Hamilton). Miss Mueller will distribute to every visitor of the Court a little Swiss Flag as a souvenir.

The Swiss Court has been organised in conjunction with the Swiss Embassy by an Organising Committee comprising three Swiss compatriots residing in New Zealand (Messrs N. Zoelly, H. Erb, L. The Swiss Fleet: A Few Figures

At the end of last year, the Swiss merchant fleet numbered 32 vessels with a total capacity of 281,615 DWT (Dead weight tons) as opposed to 31 vessels and 267,297 DWT at the end of 1965. It comprised 9 ships between 1 and 5 years old, 8 from 5 to 10 years old, 10 from 10 to 15 years old, and 5 from 15 to 20 years old. The average age of the fleet was therefore $9\frac{1}{2}$ years. At the same time, the total crew of all these ships numbered 973
