Elisa Katharina Steiner

An exceptionally large procession marked the funeral of the late Mrs Elisa Katharina Steiner at Morrinsville on Friday, 15th November. Relatives and friends from all parts of the Waikato and Taranaki arrived to pay tribute to someone everybody loved.

Elisa Betschart hailed from Mouthathal from a very music-loving family called "S'Gygers". In her early teens her father made for her a zither and before she left school she mastered this instrument as well as the guitar and the double bass, and later on the piano. After leaving school she took up a position as a house-maid with the Steiner family in Baar, Kt. Zug, and when Tony, one of the Steiner sons, left for N.Z. she followed him two years later to become Mrs Tony Steiner. The couple took up farming in Taranaki and reared a family of five daughters and two sons.

It was no easy task to rear a large family during the depression and money was scarce for a long time in the Steiner home; but there was always music — the tunes of the zither or guitar — and when the Swiss people met for a get-together Elisa Steiner played the piano for them. She was happy when all others were happy, loving everyone and being loved by everyone in return. —W.R.
