IMPROVEMENTS OF THE OLD AGE PENSIONS SINCE THE YEAR 1948

The Federal Old Age and Survivors' Insurance benefits are today in all cases a manifold of the rates existing at the very beginning. After the recent 7th revision, the minimum old age pensions for single and couples has been increased by 400% and the maximum is now 220% higher than at the time of introduction of this insurance scheme. The survivors' pensions have benefited from an even more noticeable improvement. These
