HEDY'S CORNER:

Somehow it does seem more appropriate this month to use this space for some comments made by Professor Fleiner, who is the Head for state law at the Freiburg University. When interviewed by the "Tagesanzeiger" (weekly airmail edition), Professor Fleiner had the following to say: "With this plebiscite Switzerland has now made a positive step toward becoming a member of the Convention

of Human Rights. This fact, however, does not constitute an overwhelming triumph. The accomplished fact of 'Equality for Women' is still far removed from their integration within the legal system of civil law, now under revision. Another section of civil law where substantial progress still has to be made towards equality, concerns financial as well as human and legal status. Apart from prejudiced family legal rights, women are particularly handicapped by the education system of various cantons. The need now is to remove these disadvantages and to give equal possibilities to both men and women. This plebiscite also initiated the correct constitutional platform, permitting first steps to be made for having both men and women work jointly on the proposed total revision of Federal Constitutional Laws. Such a total revision without the women's voice would have been inconceivable because women will, in equal measure with men, have to shape the future of Switzerland".

Facts (not fancies) as found in Swiss history books: Every 1st of August Switzerland celebrates its founders and the "Ruetli" is called the "cradle of Switzerland". However, where there is a cradle there must be a baby. Where there is a baby it must have been conceived by someone. Who was that someone? A woman (of course). Who was that woman? Gertrud Stauffacher. It was she who told her despairing husband: "You have stood oppression long enough. You know trustworthy men who think as you do. Confer with them how to liberate yourselves from your tyrants".

Metaphorically speaking: they liked this "baby" well enough and proceeded to build its cradle.
