★ HEDY'S CORNER

What exactly is yodelling? The second generation of Swiss can hardly be expected to give an answer to this question.

Yodelling is one of the characteristic features of Switzerland known throughout the world. Whether it rings out in the silence of a remote alpine valley or resounds repeatedly in the course of a rural festivity where the old customs are still alive, or whether it is heard in a simple, wainscotted inn or in an auditorium of one of the world's greatest theatres: it never fails to produce a remarkable spontaneous effect. It is as if a bit of unspoiled nature has become audible.

Technically speaking, yodelling is based on repeated, rapid changes from chest-voice to falsetto and back again. Its musical character is founded on these sudden changes of register. The
