

Joe Hermann of Hawera who passed away recently was Managing Director of Arthur Brown Construction Co. Ltd. at the time of his death.

This marked the conclusion of 48 years in the building trade. Some fine examples of his work are the Catholic Church at Opunake, the present Ward Block at Hawera Hospital, the Swimming Baths and the onshore building at Oaonui for Shell B.P. Todd Ltd. The Block knowwn as Powder 2 at the Kiwi Dairies site at Whareroa and the Casein Plant were two other major buildings he managed.
