Dear Mr Hochuli

As a Swiss resident, and student of Maori and Pakeha relations in New Zealand, I am most concerned at the news that the Jodler Klub will feature in the Waitangi Day celebrations on 6 February. I have been many times to the commemorations of the Waitangi Day at Waitangi and I have always been very impressed by the solemnity and seriousness with which Maori - and New Zealand officialdom - have taken the various Maori and Navy presentations. To inject in to these solemnities the Jodler Klub and Alphorns would be taken as an offense by many people as they

are completely out of place. Waitangi is a solemn compact between Maori and Britain, Switzerland and Swiss music have absolutely nothing to do in that setting. It is obvious that the Minister for Internal Affairs, Mr Lee, would like to downplay the importance of Waitangi for Maori, and he would love to "internationalise" the day, and therefore give it less relevance for Maori and everything that Waitangi stands for. Please don't play along with this! I would beg you to convince the Jodler Klub to understand this. In my opinion they should not participate in the main acts from 18.00 hours onwards on the lawn before the house. There would be absolutely nothing wrong if they would perform after the main event (in the Hotel) or before, or in another setting. There is a place and time for everything, and in my opinion the place and time during the main acts at Waitangi is not for jodeln and Alpenhorn. ## SERENADE FROM HELL

### RAILWAY CLOCKS

**Hans Hilfiker** actually wanted to invent the "pedalo", but since he worked for the Swiss Railways (**SBB**) and they had no use for this type of transport, he decided to create the now famous railway clocks. "The hand showing the seconds used to be very thin, but since, at railway stations, seconds are very important, I gave the hand the form of a ladle, which is much more visible" said Mr. Hilfiker. Also rather than advancing second by second, he made the hand go round in a continuous movement. Hilfiker, now 90 years old, always wears his invention on his wrist, in a smaller wrist watch format of course.
