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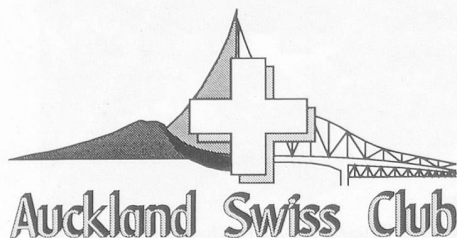

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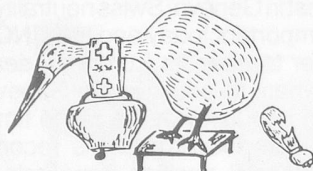

The club subs have not increased but the majority of the members present agreed to accept a possible forthcoming Swiss Society subs increase at their AGM in Hamilton from **\$10 to \$25 per annum**. This could increase our subs for single members to **\$50** and families to **\$60** per year. One of the main reasons for the increase is the lack of support by Swiss businesses. But in generally the **New Look Helvetia** is widely liked and even regarded (by other nationalities) as one of Aucklands best ethnic Society magazines.

Financially we are in a fairly good position. Last years net profit was **\$1500** and the **Farm Donation Account** stands at **\$2000** at present. Our fixed yearly overheads are **\$2000** (rates, insurance, etc.).

Andre Eckert's motion (re: last NL) was swiftly discussed and we will now get some quotes from contractors to cut the gorse. The money, if we can afford it will come from the club's account. **This should not stop the motivated members to go up there and cut some gorse in their spare time of course.** The bunks will be ready for summer 199? **Markus & Willi** said.

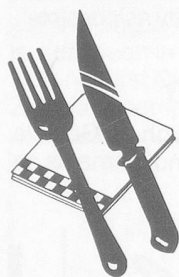
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FIGURES SHOW ETHNIC MIX

Maori, Samoan, Chinese, Indian and Tongan Communities in New Zealand recorded the greatest increase in population between the 1986 census and the 1991 Census says the Statistics Department.

Information released yesterday in a report entitled New Zealand's Multicultural Society showed that in the 1991 census 83 per cent of New Zealanders considered themselves European and 10 per cent Maori.

A deputy Government Statistician, Mr Dennis Trewin said "European" comprised New Zealand Europeans, Australian, English, Scottish, Irish, Dutch, Canadian, Swiss and other European ethnic groups. Numbers in this category totalled 2,618,445 with New Zealand Europeans making up 93 per cent.

Maori ethnic numbers increased the most between census up 28,000 to 323,493, followed by Samoans (up 18,000 to 68,565), Chinese (up 18,000 to 37,689), Indians (up 15,000 to 26,979) and Tongans (UP 9000 TO 18,264).

Among New Zealand European and Maori groups, women outnumbered men by a small margin of 103 to 100. However among the Filipino group there was a

ratio of 235 women for every 100 men.

Groups with the largest number of people under 15 were Tongans and Cook Islanders with 41 per cent, Samoans 39 per cent and Maori 37 per cent.

The Hungarians had the oldest population with 57 per cent of them aged over 50. This compared with the New Zealand European group which recorded 26 per cent over 50.

South Africans were the highest earners with a median income of \$21,564, followed by New Zealand Europeans with \$14,598 and Maoris \$11,001. Koreans ranked the lowest at \$4845.

Household incomes were also highest for South Africans, who joined the Sri Lankans in having median household incomes over \$50,000. the next highest were among American and Jewish groups.

Koreans had the lowest household income at \$23,501, while others below \$25,000 included the Maori, Tongan, Russian, Iranian and Thai ethnic groups.

Ninety-seven per cent of Sri Lankans reported having school qualifications, slightly more than Indian and Chinese communities. Mr Trewin said the national figure was 58 per cent, close to the New Zealand European figure of 60 per cent.

Seventy per cent of Khmers had no school qualifications and this was closely followed by Cook Islanders, Laotians, Niueans and Maoris.

The Tokelauans had the highest rate of unemployment, nearly 28 per cent. The New Zealand Europeans rate was almost 9 per cent, while the Japanese had the lowest unemployment at 4 per cent.

THE SWISS HAD THE HIGHEST NUMBER OF SELF-EMPLOYED PEOPLE AT 31 PER CENT, followed by the Greeks and the Lebanese.

EUROPEAN FAIR

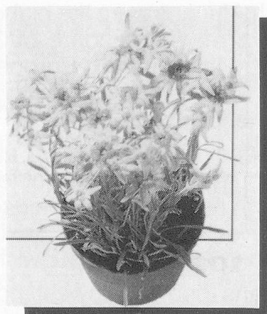

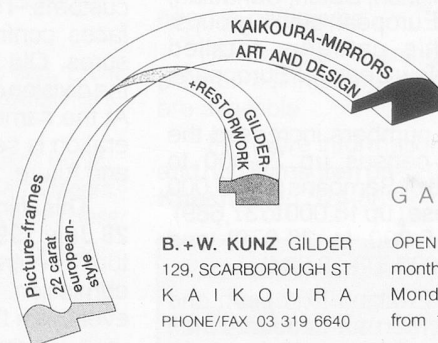
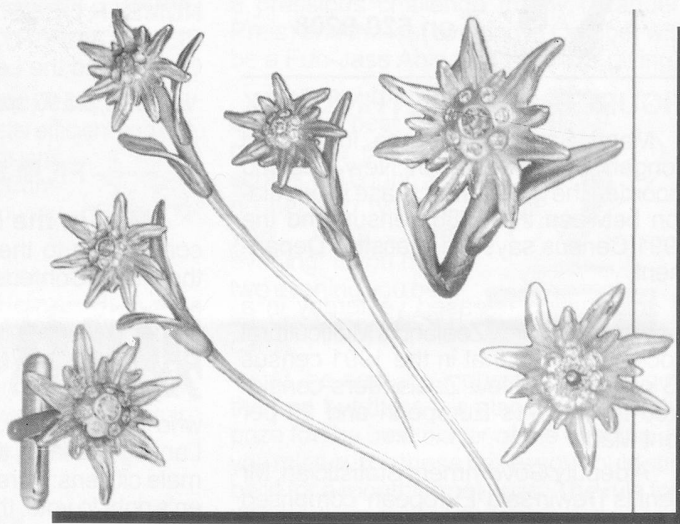
ZURICH TWO HALF- CANTONS ?

Relationships between the city of Zurich and the rest of the Canton have always been rather stormy and the present financial difficulties are not helping to iron out the problems either. One of the major bones of contention could also be that the city of Zurich has a socialist majority whilst the Canton is predominantly right-wing.

Fed up with years of sterile discussions, Ursula Koch, Zurich's most fiery City Councillor, has thrown down the gauntlet: let's create two separate Cantons. Ursula Koch complains that Zurich City produces 40% of the Canton's total taxes, but that this money is not distributed in a fair way. According to her, Zurich City pays 1.2 billion SFR to the Canton but only receives 250 million back. She argues that by creating two Cantons, the City of Zurich would save over 500 million SFR a year, even after taking into account the cost of the split. She says: "Let's create a Canton of Zurichland (similar to Baselland) with its own capital in Seuzach, as far away from Zurich City as possible".
