

21 skittlers. Top score: Lisette Benkert 34 points





# OBITUARY MARGARET ALBERTINA KURIGER 1904-1994.

### HISTORY OF THE CHAMBERLAIN FAMILY OF TARANAKI BY NOELINE SHAW

The Chamberlain Family History book was launched recently at the Taranaki Swiss Club, Kaponga. It is a 130 page book including 123 photos.

The book includes the life history of Taranaki and New Zealand Saloon car champion, David "Blondie" Chamberlain.

Readers may or may not be aware that 1994 was the International Year of the Family. It was dedicated by the churches as a year when greater emphasis should have been given to binding the family unit together and thus



help our youth to have a stable background.

With this in mind, it occurred to one person that a family project would be one way to build an interest for all members and the research required in compiling her own genealogical book on her family could be a challenge. The Chamberlain family of Taranaki are a Swiss family, and four brothers came to New Zealand. Three married and settled on farms in Taranaki. Donald and Frances and family settled in Spence Road, Kakaramea. Joe and Hilda and family settled in the Stratford area and Len and Maria farmed with family on the Manaia Road, Kaponga. Frank never married. Their descendants are now scattered in all parts of New Zealand.

The number of reported Aids cases is on the increase in Switzerland too. During the first half of 1994, 339 new cases have been reported. So far of the 3827 patients registered since 1983, 2710 have already died.

The canton with the largest number of reported Aids cases is Geneva, the one with the lowest number is Obwalden.
