



MAY I INTRODUCE

In this new column we would like to introduce Chch Swiss Club members and something about their life-story. This time round I would like to introduce to you ERNST FREI, a club member now for more than 12 years. Ernst is well known amongst the local "organic food freaks", and generally the people who like clean, healthy and delicious food. Here is a recent article from "The Press", our local newspaper. It tells you a little more about Ernst and what he is up to:

CANTY FIRM LEADS WAY IN PRODUCE PACKAGING

Swiss-born Ernst Frei has long been a leader in the organic movement in Canterbury, and with his new, branded packaging is leading the way again.

He has one of New Zealand's largest and longest established organic farms (started in 1983) and when he visited Europe last year, Mr Frei studied the marketing of organic produce.

He learned that sales of organic foods in the United Kingdom had increased nearly five-fold in the last five years, and was impressed with the carton-board packaging.

On his return, Mr Frei set out to produce a simple, but effective, cardboard tray to display his fresh produce, which includes beans, courgettes, tomatoes, capsicums and sweet corn.

He also produces fruit and free-range eggs on his 12ha organic farm. "The big advantage of the new cardboard package is that you can print on it. For too long consumers have not been able to determine if organic produce was in fact organic. "We can now print that information" Mr Frei said.

European retailers accepted nothing else but bio-degradable packaging, he said. So he decided to join them.

Plastic bags were not good for many vegetables, he added. He sells produce from Wellington to Invercargill, and said the cardboard package, with a foil covering, used between 70-80 percent recycled cardboard.



The results of the competition were a little bit disappointing for the Welling-





SPREADING THE NEWS

Swiss Radio International has updated its world service. Radio broadcasting by satellite has opened up enormous potential for reaching audiences worldwide with absolute clarity, something that is often not possible with shortwave transmissions. To maintain its prestige abroad, Swiss Radio International (SRI) is therefore extending its French, English, German and Italian language satellite transmissions to provide a 24-hour round-the-clock world service.

While satellite channels will probably supersede shortwave broadcasting completely in the long term, this is unlikely in the near future, particularly with regard to developing countries where cable networks or private ownership of satellite dishes are still impracticable for economic reasons.

Consequently, SRI made a conservative estimate that the future for shortwave transmissions must still be assured for at least ten years in Europe and fifteen elsewhere. SRI will, therefore, be continuing with its existing shortwave services for the foreseeable future. The main "vector" of SRI's world service is the English language channel, described as a 'truly international service aimed at listeners who have English as their mother tongue or use it as a foreign language".


Throughout the day and night, programmes are continuous with 30 minute slots of news and current affairs frequently updated, plus in-depth reporting and features on every aspect of Swiss matters relating to the rest of the world.

The French language channel is aimed mainly at a French speaking audience in Europe and Africa and partially at other French speaking areas outside these priority regions. Particular attention is given to listeners who do not have access to reliable information in their own countries. Again, emphasis is on Swiss themes and international information with a Swiss connection.

The German language channel will be directed mainly at Swiss people living abroad as well as at the German speaking countries of Europe. In-depth features will place a clear emphasis on Switzerland and its relationship with the rest of the world.

The Italian language channel will reflect its unique position in the international radio market. SRI points out that this will be the only international radio service to distribute Italian language programmes on a worldwide basis. Alongside Italian speaking Swiss people living abroad, this channel's priority will be to focus on listeners in Italy with an interest in Switzerland, plus Italian immigrants anywhere in the world who share this interest.
