

THE EUROPEAN FORUM IN WELLINGTON

Being members of Swiss Clubs in New Zealand enables us to cultivate our traditions and common heritage. Quite a number of European groups enjoy such clubs where they meet like-minded people with whom they share culture and origin. In Wellington these clubs meet each other at the European Forum.

The European Forum provides an opportunity to interested groups which

trace their roots to Europe to gather in an informal setting, enabling its members to present their traditions, values and customs to a wider audience, thus enriching the multi-cultural society of New Zealand.

Promoting awareness of the cultures of different European communities is only one of three aims pursued by the European Forum since its inception three years ago.

It also aims to provide opportunities for different European communities to work together and combines this with the aim to raise funds, predominantly for charities nominated by members. The charity work had benefited others through the New Zealand Red Cross and the Te Omanga Hospice of Lower Hutt.

The European Forum is an informal platform for these activities based entirely on volunteer effort. A quarterly newsletter offers a wealth of information about Europe and activities of individual member groupings. The members have decided to organise two or three public events of high quality a year to reach their aims of working together, promoting awareness of European Cultures, and raising funds for charity. Feedback from the community at large seems to indicate that more and more people are reached each year, e.g. with the European Christmas Carols at the Botanical Gardens in Wellington.

The participants of the European Forum agree that they are motivated by the strength and enjoyment they draw from working for the good of others while presenting their own heritage to their next generation and to New Zealand society at large. *BER*



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
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EMPLOYMENT REQUIRED FOR A SWISS TRAINEE
