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
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AMUSEMENT PARK "BUNDESHAUS"


To mark the occasion of the first of August being an official holiday for the first time, the Federal Palace (Bundeshaus) was transformed into something like an amusement park. In addition to the usual conducted tours through the building, stalls were set up to sell 1st of August souvenirs, chocolate, cheese, apples, chocolate drinks and Swiss yoghourts. Two "Ländlerkappelen" produced a true Swiss atmosphere and

dancing was allowed in the main lobby.

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TURTLE SNATCHERS

Pet turtles have become the target for thieves in Switzerland.
