




PIC-NIC

FARM EXTENSION OF OUR LITTLE SWISS FARM IN KAUKAPAKAPA

By the time you read this we have already started with the big job up at the little Swiss farm. The donation received so far has made us very confident to go ahead and start with the extension. The first job is to do the foundation and move heaps of dirt to different locations. Very soon we should get the building permit so we can continue with the construction work. Please don't hesitate to come up the farm and take a look for your self.



This is a small report on work done up the Swiss farm from 1985 to 1995 compiled by the Farm Trustee. All the working bees endured by club members, the farm trustee and some worka-holics in that time required a lot of organization and management and of course hard work to create the result. Work which was done and completed up to now:

MAIN ACCESS ROAD

The main access road (Rapson Road) leading up to the parking area and the hut was bulldozed and covered with gravel. A road drainage system was installed at the same time. Ongoing maintenance made sure that the road kept in good shape.

HUT AND GROUND MAINTENANCE

A new goat fence with five gates was installed around the hut area to keep the grazing cows outside. The B.B.Q. area and the toilet also went through a major revamp. The still basic toilet was upgraded with a septic tank. This made it possible to install a proper flush toilet and a hand basin with tap water. The hut it self was re-roofed with colour steel and a rotating chimney cap was installed. Being proud of our flag(s) prompted us to plant a big, galvanised flag pole. A twenty foot steel container was purchased, reconditioned and equipped with shelves and cupboards. It is situated close to the hut and serves as a lockable storage for tools, the cocking utensils and much more. A small two target air rifle range for picnic fun shooting was built. Seven big and very solid picnic tables sponsored by club members were built and brought up to the farm. A flying fox was installed for our young members. The retaining wall replacing the temporary tea-tree con-struction was drilled and concreted in place. Also the little dirt track to the toilet was widened. Just a little up the hill a small bush hut for the kids turned up one weekend. General maintenance in and around the farm hut takes place many times a year by members who like to spend family weekends away from home in a more quiet and pleasing environment.

SHOOTING RANGE RENOVATION AND UPGRADING

The shooting house received a new roof and wall paint job. New gutters and down pipes were installed to feed the water into the newly commissioned water tank. New doors and heavy window shutters were assembled and bolted on the house. Around the range a fence with gate was built. Inside the house a sleeping bunk for approx. 20 people was built. The toilet was also fixed and a bit improved. To get to the butts a new road was constructed over the creek down the valley and up the other hill. The changeable target frames are now housed in a very save and solid wooden construction.

GORSE

Our team of 7 to 15 young and old has and still is cutting and spraying gorse as its growth is never ending. Nearly every working bee in the last ten years called for this dying breed of volunteers to look after the horrible gorse. We all hope sincerely to win at least this battle against mother nature.

All work was always done with the best materials available for the money we could spend. The idea was and still is to put our labour into something which will please you and last for many years to come. Once more we would like to invite you to support our friendly and steadily increasing family club. Your money is surely well invested for now and future generations.
