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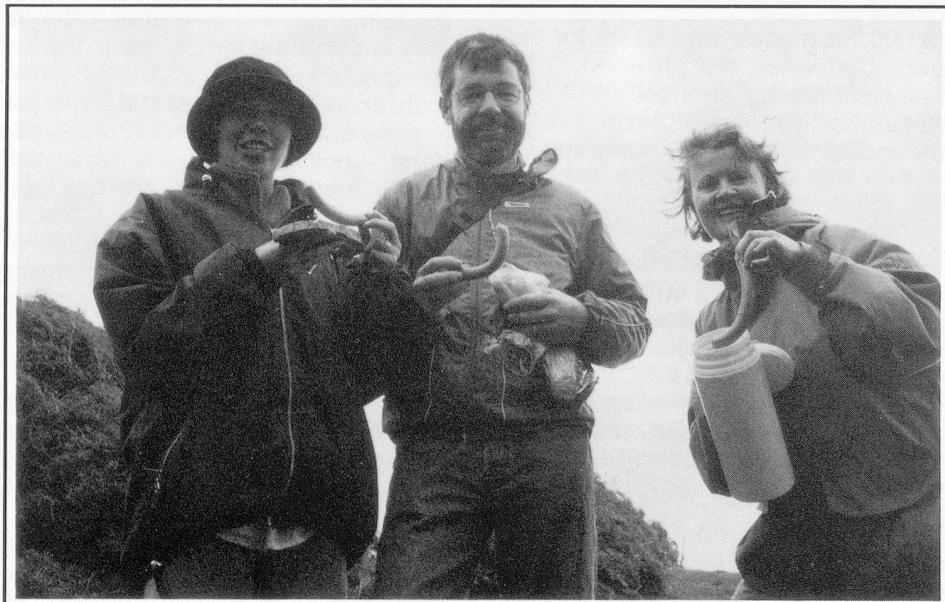
The tombola was a success, although some might have had a bit of a surprise. It was well after midnight when we left the club house, content with the fondue and a very friendly evening.

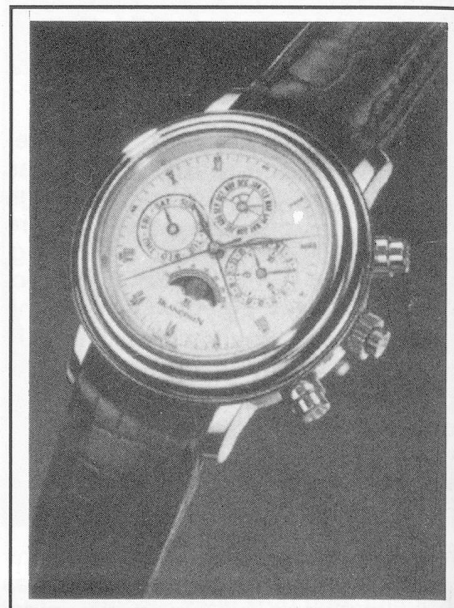

THE WORLD'S MOST COMPLICATED WATCH



The Swiss firm Blancpain has been awarded six stars by the German magazine "Chronos" for its watch called "1735", which has established a world record for complication watches. The 1735 includes all of the six classic complications: ultra-thin movement, calendar with phases of the moon, perpetual calendar, split-second chronograph, tourbillon and minute repeater. The creation of this jewel, a veritable symphony of time, involves two months just to manufacture the parts, and a full year for the assembly by a master watchmaker. The cost of such an instrument, which is being produced in a limited edition with a maximum of 30 watches, is around NZ\$900,000 each.
