




#### 1<sup>st</sup> of August Celebration





## Second Attempt at UN Membership

Twelve years after Swiss voters overwhelmingly rejected joining the UN, the timing now seems to be on cue for trying again.

The Blockade between East and West, with its associated conflicts, is now over. Today, the Security Council is primarily involved in prevention; imposition of sactions; and occassionally, limited military actions. And with the problems of globalisation in economic, political, environmental and social areas, it is felt that many matters can no longer be dealt with entirely at a national level.

According to the Minister of Foreign Affairs, Mr Flavio Cotti, Switzerland's foreign policies of the 1990's are close to being identical with those of the UN. The goals in the peace, human rights, and environment policies, as well as in humanitarian aid, would be much better served by a world encompassing organisation, rather than by continuing alone.

The question of neutrality, the main barrier for the 76% NO vote in 1986, now seems to be "agreeable". And as a full member, apart from the compulsory dues, Switzerland would, under certain circumstances, have to provide its armed forces to re-establish democracy and to safeguard humanitarian help. It would also be required to uphold any economic sanctions imposed by the Security Council; and all these actions are already presently being fulfilled on a voluntary basis. The country
