Second Attempt at UN Membership

Twelve years after Swiss voters
overwhelmingly rejected joining the
UN, the timing now seems to be on
cue for trying again.

The Blockade between East and
West, with its associated conflicts, is
now over. Today, the Security
Council is primarily involved in pre-
vention; imposition of sanctions; and
occasionally, limited military ac-
tions. And with the problems of
globalisation in economic, political,
environmental and social areas, it is
felt that many matters can no longer
be dealt with entirely at a national
level.

According to the Minister of Foreign
Affairs, Mr Flavio Cotti, Switzer-
land's foreign policies of the 1990's
are close to being identical with
those of the UN. The goals in the
peace, human rights, and environ-
ment policies, as well as in humani-
tarian aid, would be much better
served by a world encompassing
organisation, rather than by continu-
ing alone.

The question of neutrality, the main
barrier for the 76% NO vote in 1986,
now seems to be "agreeable". And
as a full member, apart from the
compulsory dues, Switzerland
would, under certain circumstances,
have to provide its armed forces to
re-establish democracy and to safe-
guard humanitarian help. It would
also be required to uphold any eco-
nomic sanctions imposed by the Se-
curity Council; and all these actions
are already presently being fulfilled
on a voluntary basis. The country

NEWS OF SOCIETY MEMBERS

My President's message this month
quotes the number of "Society-only"
members, at the time of writing, as
106, however this has since in-
creased to 107. On 11 August, the
Society gained its first non-New Ze-
land resident member, and I would
like to warmly welcome Mr Marco
Kappenberger, who lives in Western
Samoa. I am told that there are a
number of Swiss living in Samoa, as
well as on other South Pacific Is-
lands, creating even the possibility
of forming a new "Off-Shore" Club!!
Most definitely though, with the as-
sistance of our new member, I will
be doing my best to increase num-
bers in this yet "untapped" region. I
must admit that I never really
thought about these Swiss citizens



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would in no way be obliged to take part in confrontational military actions under the UN banner (eg. Iraq / Iran conflict).

Last year, Switzerland paid a total of Sfr470 million to the United Nations, making it one of the "most important payers". Reliable calculations show that membership would increase this expenditure by 'only' a further amount of Sfr36 million. On the other hand, this money is returned to Switzerland five to six-fold. UN activities support the annual Geneva economy by Sfr2½ - 3 billion. Presently, Geneva is still the most important location in Europe, but opposition is becoming very acute. At the same time Switzerland's observer status is now only marginal. Of the 17 observer nations which existed at the beginning of 1948, only one other, the Vatican City, still remains. The Federal Council stresses the point that at present the country is already performing the more important duties on a voluntary basis, but forfeits the most important right - to be able to vote and elect as a member in UNO General Assembly.

The aim of my research was to fill in some of the gaps relating to migration since the Second World War, in particular the reasons for this migration, the travel experiences of the Swiss who migrated, and the degree of integration of Swiss New Zealanders into their adopted country. To this end I conducted 50 interviews with Swiss living in the Auckland, Waikato and Coromandel areas.

Swiss contact with New Zealand date back two centuries, to 1777. The first Swiss to set foot in both Australia and New Zealand was almost certainly a man called John Webber, whose father was a Wäber from Berne.
