Report / Swiss Abroad Congress

(as supplied by Heinz Leuenberger)

At the autumn Session of the Council of the Swiss Abroad (CSA) the Delegates unanimously accepted a resolution, that the seven sectarian contracts with the EU be ratified (by the Federal Parliament) as early as possible. According to President G.Stucki, the free movement of people contained in one of the sectors, is of particular interest to the "Swissies" living in a European

Union country, emphasising the fact that close to 60 % of the 572,000 plus Swiss registered abroad, live in Western Europe.

AHV / IV

The political discussions on how to revise the voluntary AHV/IV payments are still very much up in the air. The CSA is not happy with the latest developments. The Council is still of the opinion, that all Swiss Abroad should continue to have the opportunity to join the scheme irrespective of whether there are sufficient possibilities to insure against old age in their country of residency or not.

Swiss Radio International

General of the The Director Radio Gesellschaft Schweizer (SRG) Mr. Armin Walpen, informed delegates of the new strategy the SRI is shortly going to follow. He made it very clear that in the competitive environment of international communications, the SRI had to keep up with developments - or fall behind the 'eight ball'. As a consequence, the newest form of the rapidly changing international communication, meaning the internet must be adopted. At this point in time, the Internet does not spell out

the death warrant of 'short wave radio'. He assured delegates, that while new 'vectors' were needed, short wave listeners would continue to be catered for.

The Congress

Close to 800 participants from 41 countries took part in this year's Congress in Lausanne. sador Mr Bruno Spinner, chief of the integration bureau in Bern, informed compatriots of the results achieved in the negotiations with the EU. According to the best expertise available, as far as the general public is concerned, the costs of the contracts are very cost effective. The economic, as well as the ecological benefits exceed the costs incurred several times over. He also made it clear that the contracts do in no way signify a way forward in the argument to join the EU. Adding that the results are acceptable to the pro-Lobby just as much as they are acceptable to the anti-Lobby and the undecided. As is normal in Swiss politics, both camps were given time to expound their points of view. Yet, non of the major political parties was prepared to state categorically which way they are going to vote in the up-coming Parliamentary debates.

For a growing Swiss presence in the big world

Tradition has it for a member of the Federal Council to address the Congress. This year the prerogative

fell to the Minister of Foreign Affairs, Mr. Joseph Deiss. He brought the best wishes from the Council to the 'Fifth Switzerland'. In his address the new Minister stressed the necessity of a much stronger presence in world affairs. To follow the present Foreign Policy, equals a continued isolation. Consequently, a new policy must be defined, naming as target the entry into the UNO as the most important for the up-coming 1999-2003 legislature. He also made it clear that Switzerland would maintain it's neutrality. However, for maintaining peace, a policy of participation far outweighs a policy of neutrality that leads to isolation, vis-avis the multilateral security nets. Neutrality encompasses a political dimension which must be adjusted

to the existing circumstances.

Disappointment

I'm very disappointed that the latest communications from the Secretariat contained no fewer than 7 pages of various forms of advertising and oly 4 pages of 'real' information. One of the ads. was for applications for the Youth Session at the Federal Parliament in Bern from 16. - 21. Nov. 99. It's not that there would be many 'budding' politicians from NZ. aged between 14 and 21 that would have been interested to apply. My complaint is that applications were to be in by 20th Oct. 1999, when the info. arrived with me only 9 days earlier??
