



GERMAN PLAY

The Department of Germanic Languages and Literature, University of Auckland, would like to introduce this year's German play, "Reigen".

"First tell me, do you really love me?"

Arthur Schnitzler's "Reigen" (round dance) was written in Habsburg, Vienna in 1896/97, published in 1903 and was first performed by Max Reinhardt's "Kleines Schauspielhaus" in Berlin the day before Christmas in 1920. The successful play was banned, however, because it challenged conventional drama by addressing issues which were social taboos. Subsequently it was not performed again until 1982. The round dance symbolises the play's linked sequence of romantic encounters in which every character betrays and is betrayed. Thus Schnitzler addresses the poverty of double standards and shows how these can take place at all social levels. "Reigen" is an entertaining satire. It uses humorous dialogue to underscore how mismatched human romances can be.

Schnitzler's "Reigen" is directed by Stephan Resch and co-director Stefan Söhnchen, and performed by a talented and enthusiastic cast of students of the Department of Germanic Languages and Literature, University of Auckland.

Performances will be held in the University's English Department

Drama Studio from May 8 to May 13. There will be six evening performances at 7.30 pm and additionally four matinées at 12.30pm on Tuesday May 9, Wednesday May 10, Friday May 12 and Saturday May 13

Did you know.... ?

Swiss wax sculptress, Marie Tussaud, died 150 years ago, on 16th April 1850. In 1835 she founded the now famous wax figure museum in London's Baker Street (now situated in Marylebone Rd.). Many of the wax figures still on display were sculpted by Madame Tussaud herself. The collection of life-size models is continuously updated.

What is the purpose of the Organisation of the Swiss Abroad (OSA)

Contribution by Heinz Leuenberger

The Organization for the Swiss Abroad (OSA) is supported by some 750 associations and clubs for Swiss expatriates, and by various Swiss institutions all over the world. It was founded in 1916 by the New Helvetic Society and it is the representative organization of the Fifth Switzerland.

In 1989 it acquired its own legal personality with the status of a Foundation.

Its supreme authority is the Council of the Swiss Abroad (CSA), which is

the "Parliament of the Fifth Switzerland". The CSA comprises delegates from abroad as well as members in Switzerland, and deals with all matters concerning Swiss Abroad.

The Services provided by the OSA comprise;

- Representing the interest of the "Fifth Switzerland"
- Consultation and care
- Information
- Contact with Switzerland

The Organs of the OSA;

The top organ is the Swiss Abroad Council, often called the Parliament of the 'Fifth Switzerland'. The Council consists of elected delegates (4-year term), from abroad as well as so-called 'Inland' members. It's main
