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and has in many instances already been replaced by a "nurse-cow regime" (**Ammen-Kuh-Haltung**), producing meat (veal) only. And the height of the irony is that some Swiss dairy farmers (of traditional stock) have to *buy* their milk for home consumption!

Swiss shop prices for most dairy products, I understand, are still well above EU shop prices, and most people living near Switzerland's borders cross regularly into 'foreign lands' to purchase their daily needs of such products.

Cynical Swiss people are making fun of the situation, and are trying to belittle their farmers' problems by pointing out that farmers have traditionally been bemoaning their plight since 'time immemorial'. The following new joke is currently making the rounds: *New regulations for Swiss dairy farmers announce a two month training course for all...during the first month they will be trained to improve their ability to fill in forms for subsidies, and in the second month all Swiss dairy farmers will visit the Wailing Wall in Jerusalem in order to improve their 'moaning abilities' !!*

So you can understand that besides a lot of Swiss chocolate, we returned to New Zealand from our Swiss trip with lots of 'food for thought', especially as one of my Swiss mountain-farmer friends remarked that *his* plight is all due to the overproduction created by America, Canada, Australia and New Zealand....!

How would you have answered him in my position ??

The dates for the film showings have not been completely finalised (at time of writing, early October) but are provisionally scheduled for 1st and 8th November.

The **Festival** will provide Aucklanders and visitors with a virtual "window on Europe". The Embassy greatly appreciates the co-operation of the Swiss Community.
