Later on he was conscripted into the Prussian Army and went to Berlin; he had to walk all the way there and back. He married and had his own large family. They eked out a meagre living by farming and home weaving. He bought and sold cotton, with little success, was always in debt, had a nagging wife at his heels - and in spite of all this he managed to take time out to write the story of his life. Friends introduced him to literature. He read all of Shakespeare and was so moved that he gave his own comment to all the plays.

I am sure you would all love to read 'ULRICH BRAEKERS', Lebensgeschichte und Natuerliche Ebentheuer des Armen Mannes im Tockenburg, and his Gespraeche ueber Shakespeare. For a loan of the book ring Trudi at 04 562

We also had two children's books in very simple language: 'Der Findefuchs and Die grauen und gruenen Felder', by Ursula Woelfel.
