After working in Rotrist for about two years my Grandma also moved to Gais. She worked at a sewing company called Eisenhut. There she made friends with two ladies. Once married Jacob and my Grandma moved to Niederteufen where they bought a house. My Grandparents a dairy. Shortly after, my Grandma's father died. Through this time my grandparents had built up a fair sized farm with chickens, sheep, dogs, pigs and cats but my Grandfather worked full time for the Milk, Butter and Cheese Trade St. Gallen-Appenzell by

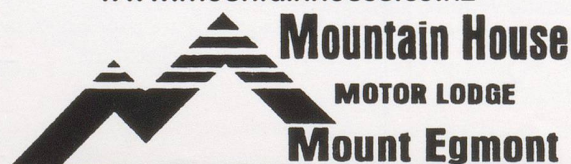

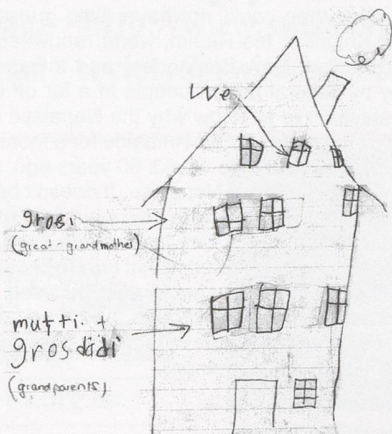

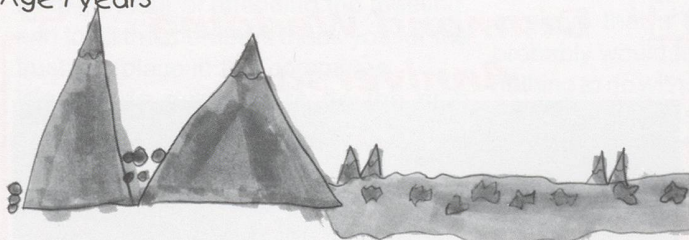
My Homeland!

Where is the alpine slope?

The Alpine Slope is part of the Alps, a mountain range in South Central Europe. The landscape includes huge mountains and deep valleys with forests of beech, oak and chestnut trees growing on the lower slopes of the mountains. At higher levels there are grasslands and pine forests. Only low bushes grow at still higher elevations, while the mountaintops are covered in rocks and glaciers. Melting snow from the Alps feeds many rivers.

Hydroelectric plants along alpine rivers provide much of Italy's electric power. The people of the alpine region live in small, scattered communities, and make their living by farming and herding. Many tourists visit the Alps to ski.



Fact File

The Apennines stretch almost the entire length of Italy. These mountains have steep inclines of soft rock that are constantly being eroded as a result of heavy rains, overgrazing of sheep and goats, and the clearing of forests for timber and farmland.
