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

**Frank von Hospenthal**  
**3 December 1944 -**  
**7 September 2004**



Frank was the eldest son of five children of the late Zeno and Freda Hospenthal. After leaving school Frank became a cheesemaker (at Kapuni) and then joined a crew installing the gas pipeline to Wellington. Thereafter he worked in the main workshop for Fletchers in Wellington as a mechanic on bulldozers and cranes.

In the 1980s he started his own business repairing and erecting cranes, both in New Zealand and overseas. He became the Australasian crane maintenance and erection specialist for Morrow Leibherr.

Frank had three daughters and one granddaughter. Several months ago Frank enjoyed his first holiday overseas, and especially took pleasure in visiting his sister Antoinette and family in Switzerland.

Frank was tragically killed in a work-related accident on the Wellington waterfront erecting a crane.

The Taranaki Swiss Club (to whom he had remained loyal even though he hadn't lived in Taranaki for some time) and the Swiss Society of New Zealand extend their deepest sympathy to Franks' family.

All club members will be sent a newsletter some time in February with all the dates for next year so look out for this or check the February issue of the *Helvetia* for more details.



**Obituary**  
**Heinrich Oettli,**  
**17.11.1918 - 29.10.2004**



Heinrich Oettli could be described as an archetypal Swiss. He started his working life as a farmer working on his father's farm at Oberbussnang (TG), and a few years later graduated to running a 'Molkerei', a small (by NZ standards) cheese and milk factory in Weinfelden (TG).

In 1956 he decided, together with his elder brother Hans, to emigrate to New Zealand, arriving with his family early in 1957 to take up farming in Rukuhia, near Hamilton. I still admire his, and my father's courage to move his wife and their three children to the other side of the world. Like anything he touched, he made it a success, and he and his family managed to settle well into a new culture and become part of New Zealand society. The secret of his success was undoubtedly his ready smile that signaled a friendly, tolerant and outgoing personality. It enabled him to adapt and make new friends easily, and to find new ways of doing business, farm work, and relating to neighbours and acquaintances who very quickly became friends.

Heinrich was also good with his hands. Like his father, he had a quick grasp of the intricacies of mechanical appliances, and there were very few engines, appliances or gadgets that he was not able to maintain and fix. He was also very creative, and with his lead-light work, he produced some pieces that will become heirlooms and delight many generations of his descendants in the future. Another gift that Heinrich brought to those around him was his love of music. He was an excellent accordion player, having had his own dance band in Switzerland, and he delighted large numbers of Swiss Club members with his playing, until arthritis silenced his playing, far too early for his appreciative audiences.

But above all, Heinrich was a people person, easily bridging the gap between the Swiss community and the new society he and his family found and adapted to in New Zealand. The large gathering of friends at his funeral attested to his ability to relate to both cultures.

Heinrich is survived by his wife and life-long helpmate, Leoni, his three children, Heinz, Ruedi and Marianne, eight grandchildren, and great-grandchildren.

I once discussed the concept of 'tangata whenua' with a Maori friend, who said it was when the bones of their ancestors were laid to rest in New Zealand soil. Heinrich was born in Switzerland, but is buried in his new home country. We all mourn his passing, but take comfort from the fact that he now rests in the soil of his adopted land. May he rest in peace.




### The Mystery Tour (Trudi)
