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Charlie Schuler

1918 - 2008

Charlie was born to Swiss Immigrant parents, Karl and Matilda Schuler at Kaponga on 8th October 1918, and has a younger sister, Tilly. At the age of seven, Charlie started school at Kapuni, unable to speak a word of English. In 1926 Charlie and his mother returned to Switzerland for eighteen months to catch up with family, where he attended school in Grindelwald. Upon arriving back in New Zealand, Charlie returned to Kapuni School and completed his education at fourteen to work on the family farm milking cows for his parents.

In 1933 they purchased the farm on Palmer Road, where Charlie and his dad worked hard to get it in top order. The Kapuni River ran through their farm and was a source of good quality concrete shingle. Charlie sold the odd load to locals, and also started to do some concreting jobs with a hand mixer. He really enjoyed this and left the milking to Tilly and her husband Cyril. He then put a petrol motor on the hand mixer to make work easier, and this was the start of his business.

On 11th November 1944, Charlie married Doreen Watts and they were blessed with five children – Faye, Judy (who sadly pre-deceased her dad), Neil, Ian and John. Both Charlie and Doreen worked hard at their business, and in 1973 Neil joined the business. Charlie never really retired; he just slowed down over the last few years. He liked nothing more than to go out to the workshop to make concrete products, and to give the boys the odd tune up!!!

A big part of Charlie's life was the Taranaki Swiss

Club, of which he was a Life Member and Patron. He was also a Life Member of the Swiss Society of New Zealand. Along with several others, Charlie was the driving force behind the building of our Club house at Kaponga, which was opened in 1981. Charlie enjoyed the companionship of their friends at the Swiss Club, including playing jass, and they hardly missed a Club function. For many years Charlie undertook all the maintenance jobs at the Club house, and many years ago allowed the Swiss Club to use their land on Opunake Road for the "Karabiner" shooting. Charlie spoke 'schweizer-deutsch' very well, and until the end enjoyed conversing in the dialect. Together with Doreen they enjoyed travelling, especially to his beloved Grindelwald, and also took great pleasure in our Club trips away. Charlie's love for Swiss food, especially sauerkraut, sausages and chocolate, were well-known, as was his fondness of schnaps!!! Charlie was a very loyal, dedicated and generous Club member who will be sadly missed.

He was honoured with a Guard of Honour by many members of the Taranaki Swiss Club in their traditional, colourful costumes, the singing group sang the Swiss National Anthem and Othmar played the Alphorn. A large crowd gathered to farewell him, and he was laid to rest at the Kaponga cemetery.
