

Onehunga to Stonefields Walk, 6 November

A WALK ON AUCKLAND'S OTHER HARBOUR

Because there was a forecast of the weather seriously declining in the afternoon, our organiser Nelly had cut the planned walk on the north shore of Manukau Harbour from Onehunga to Stonefields in half for this Sunday in early November. So most of us met at the halfway mark on Creamery Road, Mangere, re-distributed ourselves into some of the cars and drove back to Onehunga Lagoon where we found Isabella and Max with their two children amongst a Sea Scout water event in full swing. After a brief introduction to the geology of the area, our group of 14 people now headed to the shore of the Manukau Harbour, crossing the motorway over the beautiful new footbridge. Then we headed south, in warm sunny weather, along the newly landscaped walkway, first passing the port facilities with its (now obsolete?) brightly labelled Holcim cement silos and next crossing over the old harbour bridge which has also been done up as a car free zone. On the Mangere foreshore we examined the spectacular lava blisters and ropy pahoehoe lava surfaces on the flows that had come down from Mangere mountain some 30 000 years ago. To the west of us we could see some dark clouds moving in, but the sea still sparkled brightly. We had our packed lunches at Ambury Farm Park, and then proceeded towards Mangere Lagoon, a hole excavated by a volcanic eruption. As we now were in the bird sanctuary, we were initially a bit disappointed as we did not see much life on the wing. However a bit further on, things got better and we could observe hundreds of pied oystercatchers, knots, a group of spoonbills, a few pied stilts, Caspian terns, a black reef heron and quite a few other birds. Susie, our photographer went into overdrive! We got back to the cars we had left in the morning without having got wet, and did the drop-off back at the Onehunga Lagoon, very satisfied with this interesting walk. Many thanks, Nelly for having the idea and organising us.




maybe Waikino or Mackytown, Paeroa or Waihi? It was a great walk which ended at the Frischknecht's for coffee and cake. Anna Blaettler



Obituary



Werner Fässler 1 August 1933 – 5 November 2016

Werner was born in Brülisau, Appenzell, on the first of August 1933. He was the fourth child of eight to parents Albert and Lina Fässler who were goat and dairy farmers. Werner started school at the age of seven. Summer school holidays were fun but hard, spent with an uncle in Rehhütte up in the alps taking care of brown Swiss cows and during autumn he loved helping his mother fill sacks with pine needles and herbs which were used as duvets during winter time. Werner did his apprenticeship as a butcher in Wil. In 1957 he sailed to New Zealand and worked a while at Horotiu meat works and Huttons. In 1958 together with Albert Schweizer and Ernst Wüthrich, Werner headed up north passing by Opononi and visited Tane Mahuta, the huge kauri tree. In 1960 Werner went to Sydney to work and then in 1961 was in the Melbourne region in a small town of Hay where he worked on a sheep farm for seven months. In 1962 Werner slowly made his way back by visiting the Philippines, China, Thailand, India, Israel, Greece, Italy and finally back home to Appenzell, Switzerland, in time for his only sister Lina's wedding in 1963.

Werner settled in Brülisau and worked on the family farm together with his father. During this time he met Albina Manser. They married in 1970 and together they moved to Thurgau where they worked as farmers for 10 years. During this time they had four children, first Urs, followed by Erich, then Evelyn closely followed by Andrea.

On the 9th of May 1980 Werner and his family immigrated to New Zealand where he and Albina set up the Swiss Sausage Company in Te Aroha-West. For many years they worked together making and selling their products. Their Bratwurst, Cervalats and Wienerli came to be known far and wide. Sadly Albina passed away suddenly in June 1997. The decision to close the Swiss Sausage Co was made and a new era in Werner's life began. Retirement and being a grandfather.

Werner is grandfather to ten grandchildren. He loved nothing better than spending some quality time with family and friends. He loved tramping the Wairongomai tracks with his friend or children's friends. Every year he travelled to visit his Swiss grandkids when it was summer over there. Back in New Zealand he loved cooking Sunday dinners for his son Erich's family and playing Jass with his grandson, Daniel Fässler. He had a great sense of humour, an adventurous spirit and an unwavering faith.

Sadly Werner passed away on 5th November 2016. Werner is survived by his four children and nine grandchildren.
