Then Anita Zuber tells us all about the Aaerschluht a place she and Walter visited in 2018.


The Furka Steam Railway, Milking Shed to Security Ink are great reads as well.

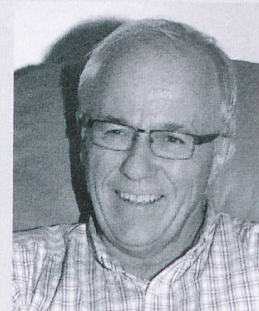
Apology to Joan Waldvogel
