# The history of Taranaki's Swiss Club

In the early or mid-1900s a Swiss Club was formed which went into recess before one of the World Wars. Unfortunately we don't have much information about this, but we

would love to hear from anyone who does as we don't appear to have anything in our club archives. However, we do have history about our current club.

On November 6, 1951 the first meeting of Foundation Members was held at Mr F Gwerder's place with 17 Swiss present. At this meeting it was decided to form a Swiss Social Club for the benefit and welfare of Swiss people in Taranaki. A temporary committee was elected to get the ball rolling with the following office holders:

Chairman: Mr W Risi Secretary: Mr L M Nolly

Committee members: Mr F Gwerder, Mr F Imhof, Mr J Kaiser,

Mr W Fluehler and Mr J Steiner.

Also present: Mr E Chamberlain, Mr JA Kaiser (sen), Mr T Napflin, Mr F Suter, Mr A Schuler, Mr J Dettling, Mr A Romer, Mr W Nolly, Mr T Schelbert, Mr A Risi.

Five shillings were collected from each of the 17 members present to get some starting capital. The secretary was instructed to get rules drafted to have the club registered under the name Swiss Social Club Incorporated.

On December 5, 1951, the rules were discussed at length, and with a few minor amendments, were ready for adoption at an Annual General Meeting. The Solicitor for the new club was Stratford's Mr Hugh Thomson.

New editor Terese asked our Swiss Clubs to tell us more about how they came to be. In this issue, we start with Taranaki. The inaugural AGM was held on March 29, 1952 in the Mangatoki Hall, between Eltham and Kaponga. The following office holders and committee were moved and seconded:

Patron: Father Butler

President: Mr W Risi and Vice President: Mr J Steiner

Secretary/Treasurer: Mr L M Nolly

Executive: Mr F Imhof, Mr J Steiner, Mr H Helbling, Mr Schupfer, Mr F Gwerder, Miss I Bernold, Mr W Fluehler, Mr P Zimmerman, Mr C Chamberlain, Mr D Luond, Mr H Schicker.

Card evenings were held and the first picnic was held on February 28, 1953 from 10am at Kaupokonui Beach.

Some years later, the Swiss Club purchased some land from Mr Len Chamberlain, and eventually, after much hard work and planning by many club members, the Taranaki Clubhouse was officially opened in 1981. Today we are so grateful for the foresight to build, and determination to complete such a big project culminating in the beautiful clubhouse and landscaped grounds we have today. Our club has a membership of 325.

With only a few minor rule changes over the years, the committee decided in 2017 to change our name to Taranaki Swiss Social Club Incorporated to identify where we are from. Our Swiss Club has, over the years, been very fortunate in having wonderful, dedicated committees led by committed and loyal presidents. We currently have a strong committee of 14, who are passionate about keeping our club thriving, and continuing to foster and promote the Swiss culture and traditions set by our forebears.



# Hamilton's first committee meeting

Mr Risi opened Hamilton's first committee meeting at 8.30pm on Sunday December 2, 1956. Firstly he welcomed the President Mr Biland who had just returned from a trip to Switzerland

and he asked if he would give us a talk about his trip. Mr Biland excused himself for not being prepared for a speech but he said in a few words his impression from Switzerland: "There is only one Switzerland and even if you have not seen it for many years there is something there that will never change and that is the Alps. I felt very much at home and I am very proud to be a Swiss citizen."

*Minutes:* Mrs Amman and the secretary were excused for the minutes because she was unable to attend.

The Treasurer was asked to read his report and balance sheet, it was carried.

The next point to be settled was the cheque account, and it was agreed that the cheque must be signed either by the treasurer and president or treasurer and secretary.

Third point was in connection about the picnic, the arrangement of which was offered by the Auckland branch. After a rather long discussion it was agreed either January 20 or 29 would be most suitable for our branch and to leave the decision to them.

Mr Risi raised the question about the charges for the committee members on the social evenings. The treasurer proposed that no entrance fee should be charged to members of the committee in return of their duties and functions. After a long discussion, the majority disagreed to the proposal and Joe Arnett moved that the committee pays for this year and Mr Binzeager seconded it. It was further moved that the president is only

entitled to reward members or guests for their items contributed to a social evening.

Arising out of an incident where an outside party brought liquor on to the place, it was

Mr Joe Arnett addressed the committee that he was able to provide a Christmas cake without charge for a raffle on the coming social evening. It was agreed the raffle to be sixpence a ticket and sell as many as possible. Mr J Loetscher moved, seconded by Mr W Risi and it was carried.

Mr Binzegger was put in charge to provide beer, soft drinks and cigarettes for the next function. The committee fully decided to have a buffet supper, and the secretary was left in charge of it.

The meeting closed at 12 o'clock followed by a lovely supper offered by Mrs W Risi.
