Notes on Contributors

DAVID J. ALLERTON, Professor of English Linguistics at the University of Basle, is the author of *Essentials of Grammatical Theory* (1979), *Valency and the English Verb* (1982), and a variety of other publications, mainly on syntax, morphology, text-linguistics and intonation.

JOHN G. BLAIR, Professor of American Literature and Civilisation at the University of Geneva, has published *The Poetic Art of W. H. Auden* (1965) and *The Confidence-Man in Modern Fiction* (1979). The manuscript of his next book, entitled 'Modular America,' received the 1985 Ralph Henry Gabriel Prize from the American Studies Association at its biennial conference in San Diego.

WERNER BRÖNNIMANN is *Wissenschaftlicher Assistent* in the English Department of the St. Gall Graduate School of Economics. He is the editor of Shakespeare's *Troilus and Cressida* in the bilingual series *Englisch-deutsche Studienausgabe der Dramen Shakespeare* (Tübingen: Francke 1986).

BALZ ENGLER is Professor of English at the University of Basle. He has published a study of R. A. Schröder as a Shakespeare translator (1974), a bilingual, critical edition of *Othello* (1976), a study of how the visual shape of texts affects the reading of poetry (1982), and articles ranging from Shakespearean textual scholarship to Vachel Lindsay's performance poetry and its effects on the teaching of literature.

NILS ENKVIST, formerly Donner Professor of English Language and Literature at Åbo Akademi, is Director of the Research Institute of the Åbo Akademi Foundation and the author of more than 200 articles and reviews on stylistics, text and discourse linguistics. His books include *Linguistics and Style* (with J. Spencer and M. Gregory), *Linguistic Stylistic*, and *Tekstilingvistiikan peruskäsitteitä*.

JEAN-PAUL FORSTER, who teaches English literature at the University of Lausanne, has written *Robert Graves et la dualité du réel* (1974) and various articles on modern fiction and poetry. His current research deals with the concepts of modes of discourse, genres and forms.

NEIL FORSYTH has taught at Bryn Mawr College as well as at the Universities of California at Berkeley, North Carolina and Geneva. He is now Professor of English at the University of Lausanne. His book, *The Old Enemy*, will be published later this year.

UDO FRIES is Professor of English Linguistics at the University of Zurich. He has published studies on Old and Middle English syntax, including an introduction to the language of Chaucer, and is the author of *Studien zur Textlinguistik*, a book on the relationship of questions and answers in English. He is currently working on an historical syntax of English and on a textbook on discourse analysis.

ERNEST GIDDEY, Professor of English at the University of Lausanne, is the author of various books and articles on Addison, Laurence Sterne, Samuel Rogers, William Beckford, Byron, Thomas Hardy etc. In 1974 he published a study on *L'Angleterre dans la vie intellectuelle de la Suisse romande au XVIII^e siècle*.

HARTWIG ISERNHAGEN, Professor of English at the University of Basle, has published studies of Lawrence Durrell (1969) and John Dos Passos (1983), as well as various articles on literary theory and contemporary American and Third World literature.

PIERRE E. MONNIN teaches English at the Universities of Neuchâtel and Berne. He has published an article on French phonetics and is co-author of a Rimbaud concordance, but his main field of research is Old English poetry; he is currently preparing an edition of the OE *Metres of Boethius*.

MAX NÄNNY is Professor of English and American Literature at the University of Zurich. He is the author of a book on John Dryden and of *Ezra Pound: Poetics for an Electric Age* (1973). He has contributed numerous articles on modernist authors to *English Studies*, *English Literary History*, *Paideuma* and *Word & Image*. He guest-edited the special number of *Word & Image* on "Iconicity in Literature" (1986).

GREGORY T. POLLETTA, Professor of Modern English Literature at the University of Geneva, is the editor of *Issues in Contemporary Literary Criticism* (1973) and the author of articles on contemporary critical theories of writers and the writing of fiction and poetry.

WERNER SENN is Professor of English literature at the University of Berne. His publications include books on the Elizabethan drama (1973) and on Joseph Conrad (1980) as well as articles on narrative, literary iconicity and contemporary Australian writing.

BARBARA STRÄULI is an assistant at the English Department of Zurich University, where she teaches introductory courses on Shakespeare. She is currently preparing an edition of "Henry V."

PAUL BEEKMAN TAYLOR teaches Medieval English and Old Icelandic languages and literatures at the University of Geneva. He has published several articles on Old and Middle English as well as Old Icelandic poetry and prose.

RICHARD J. WATTS is Professor of English Linguistics at the University of Berne. He is the author of *The Pragmalinguistic Analysis of Narrative Texts: Narrative Co-operation in Charles Dickens's "Hard Times"* and a number of articles on language in use. He is currently working on interruption in verbal interaction.
