## Notes on Contributors

**Marika Ceschia** is a postdoctoral fellow at the Institute of Advanced Studies in the Humanities at the University of Edinburgh, where she is working on a new project on the maternal erasures that informed a colonial relation towards the Earth. She holds a PhD in English literature from the University of Leeds, and her research focuses on the interconnections between twentieth-century American literature and motherhood. Her first academic monograph, *Otherworldly Mothering*, which examines African American women's writing of the 1970s and 1980s, was published by Louisiana State University Press in 2024.

**Mattia Ferraro** is a doctoral researcher at the University of Neuchâtel, currently working towards his PhD under the supervision of Professor Patrick Vincent. His research focuses on representations of Switzerland and the Swiss in twentieth-century American literature and film. Prior to joining the English Studies Department at Neuchâtel, Mattia obtained a Joint Master's Degree in English and American Studies from the Ca' Foscari University of Venice and the University of Graz. His research interests include Anglo-Swiss relations; twentieth-century American literature and film; travel literature; cultural exchanges between Europe and America; literary data mining.

**Lee A. Flamand** is *Wissenschaftlicher Mitarbeiter* (Post-Doctoral Research Associate) in American Studies at Ruhr University Bochum. He holds degrees from the University of California, Berkeley and Freie Universität Berlin and is the author of *American Mass Incarceration and Post-Network Quality Television: Captivating Aspirations* (Amsterdam University Press, 2022).

**Beatrice Melodia Festa** is Adjunct Professor of American Literature and English Language at the University of Verona. Her main research interests are the intersection between American literature and the new media, a topic she analysed in her monograph *The Evolution of Virtual Identity in American Literature* (Ombre Corte, 2022). Her fields of research also include William Faulkner to whom she dedicated the book *William Faulkner sul grande schermo* (La Bottega Editoriale, 2023), cyberfiction, Afrofuturism, and intertextuality in American literature and cinema. She has published on Faulkner, Wharton, cyberfiction and Afrofuturism. She is a member of the editorial board of *Iperstoria: Journal of American and English Studies*.

**Mehdi Ghasemi** is an Adjunct Professor in the Department of English at the University of Turku, Finland. He is also a fiction writer, writing his books in the hybrid genre of “noveramatry” (a combination of novel, drama and poetry). He has already published six scholarly books, five fiction books, one literary anthology, and more than thirty scholarly papers in peer-reviewed, high-quality journals, including *Orbis Litterarum*, *Mosaic: A Journal for the Interdisciplinary Study of Literature*, *Journal of Black Studies*, *Journal of Literary Studies*, *European Journal of American Studies*, *Journal of Dramatic Theory and Criticism*, *SAGE Open, Immigrants and Minorities*, *The CEA Critic*, *Literary Geographies*, *The Polar Journal*, *Journal of Literature and Trauma Studies*, and *Contemporary Aesthetics*.

**Yifei Jing** is currently completing his doctoral studies in the Department of English at Peking University. With broader interests in global Indigenous writing, he has focused on Native North American literatures since his earlier MA project on Louise Erdrich. He publishes in English and Chinese and is also a literary translator between the two languages. This paper, prepared during his academic visit at the University of York, forms part of his doctoral dissertation, which develops Gerald Vizenor’s neologism “transmotion” as a Native literary discourse and offers new readings of his writings through this framework.

**Judit Ágnes Kádár** is the Director of International Relations and Associate Professor at the Sports University of Budapest and the University of Pannonia, Veszprém. She has taught US and Canadian culture studies for three decades, including terms in the US (GCSU, UNM). She has published *Critical Perspectives on English-Canadian Literature* (1996), *Going Indian: Cultural Appropriation in Recent North American Literature* (2012) and *Ethnic Positioning in Southwestern Mixed Heritage Writing* (Lexington, 2022) and also contributed to *The Routledge Companion to Native American Literature* (2016). She serves as an active Fulbright alumna and organizer of the 44th American Indian Workshop.

**Niki Grigoria Karamanidou** is an independent researcher and an EFL teacher focused on literature-based education. She has received a Bachelor's degree in English Language and Literature and a Master's degree in English and American studies, both from the Aristotle University of Thessaloniki. Her current research touches upon selected works of Native American literature in relation to issues of identity, space, dislocation, cultural rejuvenation and transcultural negotiations. She is interested in ecocritical readings of Native American/Native Canadian fiction, explorations of slow and epistemic violence as well as on restorative cultural practices and sustained communal resistance to these types of violence.

**Francesca de Lucia** holds a master's degree from the University of Geneva, Switzerland, and a PhD in American literature from the University of Oxford, UK. She was an associate professor at Zhejiang Normal University, Jinhua, China, and has also taught at Minzu University of China, Beijing. She currently teaches English and Italian in the Swiss education system. She is the author of *Italian American Cultural Fictions: From Diaspora to Globalization* (Peter Lang, 2017) and of articles on different aspects of ethnicity and American identity in literature, with a particular focus on Italian American, Chinese American and Jewish American literature. Her articles include "Founding Chinese America in Louis Chu's *Eat a Bowl of Tea*" (2017), "Ethnic Investigations of the American Crime Scene: Comparing Domenic Stansberry and George Pelecanos" (2022) and "Talk-Story and Storytelling between China and America in Maxine Hong Kingston's Family Memoirs" (2023).

**Deborah Madsen** is Professor of American Literature and Culture at the University of Geneva, Switzerland. She began her academic life with a specialism in literary allegory, which has led to a research career largely devoted to the ways in which different forms of rhetorical expression respond to social and cultural crises: American Exceptionalism, Feminism and Ecofeminism, race-based immigration, and US settler colonialism in relation to Critical Indigenous Studies. She currently works on two projects: the analysis of Indigenous video games as digital environmental narratives; and she is Principal Investigator of the project funded by the Swiss National Science Foundation entitled “Vegan Literary Studies: An American Textual History, c. 1776-1900.” Most of her publications are available in full-text from UNIGE’s Open Access digital repository (archive-ouverte.unige.ch).

**Viola Marchi** is a postdoctoral researcher in Literary Theory at the University of Bern, Switzerland. She studied English and Italian Literature in Pisa and Bern and received her PhD in English from the University of Bern. She has published on theories of community and the common and she is the co-editor of *Throwing the Moral Dice: Ethics and the Problem of Contingency*, published in 2021 by Fordham University Press. Her current project, tentatively called *Phantasmagorical Interventions*, investigates the politics and aesthetics of media configurations of bodies and images in African American literature and visual culture.

**Diana Martsynkovska** completed her first Masters degree in Philology, Theory and History of Literature and Comparative Studies in Kyiv Mohyla Academy, Ukraine. Currently she is pursuing her MA degree in American Studies at Humboldt University of Berlin and working at the International Department of the university.
