An avalanche has completely destroyed and carried away the Swiss Alpine Club hut on the Fergengegel (2,200 metres), Engadine.

The hut was only opened in June last year and was erected under great difficulties, involving considerable expenditure.

All that remains on the spot where the massive stone building once stood are remnants of the foundation walls and a few planks, which were found standing upright some distance away in the snow.

The first ascent this year of the Matterhorn has been accomplished by Mlle. Elvire Perren, who, accompanied by the guides Oscar Julien and Hermann Perren, jun., reached the summit at 1 p.m. on Saturday last.

One of three military aeroplanes coming from Thun last Sunday side-slipped near Bière (Vaud) and dropped on to some trees, the aeroplane engine becoming detached and burying itself deeply in the ground.

Pilot Lang from Brugg was badly, though not fatally, injured, while the observer, Lieutenant Kraft from Gloveller, had both his legs fractured and sustained other injuries which endanger his life.

A serious explosion of a munition depots occurred on the military exercise grounds of Lerchenfeld, near Thun, on Saturday last.

The dead bodies of two young boys were found 250 metres away from the scene of the explosion, and it has not yet been possible to establish where they actually were when the depot was blown up. Many people inhabiting houses in the vicinity luckily escaped with minor injuries only, but the property suffered considerable damage. The terrific concussion of the air smashed thousands of windows from Thun right up to Hilterfingen, Spiez, and Wimmis, some eight miles away.

A regrettable accident occurred on the steamer "Stadt Zürich." While she was lying at the landing stage, orders were suddenly given to alter her position. At the moment two machinists were actually in one of the paddle boxes examining the gear. When the paddles started revolving, the men were caught unawares and seriously injured, one of them, the father of six children, being crushed so badly that he succumbed before reaching hospital.
