THE FINANCIAL POSITION OF THE SWISS CONFEDERATION.

The Federal Chambers opened in ordinary ses-sion on Dec. 3rd. Among the numerous matters of the order of the day the approval of the budget of the Confederation of 1924 merits special atten-tion. One knows that the Swiss high authorities are constantly engaged in endeavouring to place the finances of the Confederation on a sound and healthy basis. It is interesting to state that their efforts have not been in vain and that solid results have been attained, as one can judge from the following figures, which we extract from the bulle-tin of the Union Bank of Switzerland. The Swiss state account was wound up in 1921 with a deficit of 127.6 million francs; in 1922 the deficiency was

reduced to 79.4 millions. For 1923 one looked for a deficit of 84 millions, but it most likely will be possible to reduce it to 60 millions. The deficit forecasted by the budget of 1924 does not reach more than 37.8 millions. This result has been ob-tained by the cutting down of expenses and by an increase in receipts. In the matter of receipts, the Custom duties show the most remarkable in-crease. The Post Office administration hopes to wind up its accounts in 1924 with a credit balance of 442,000 frames, instead of a deficit of 7.5 mil-lions forecasted for 1923. The Swiss Government is considering also the reduction of different subsidies which it has hitherto granted. Economy also will be realized in a reduction of the number of civil servants. One hopes that the ordinary budget of the Confederation will find its equilibrium again in 1925. But there are extra-ordinary credits that it is impossible to actually, refuse. They are estimated for 1923 at 48.5 mil-lion francs (39 millions for the relief of unemploy-ment, 3.5 millions for special help to the embroidery and clock and watchmaling industries, 6 millions. The economic position of the country is directly responsible for these credits; with the improvement of the same they will tend to disappear. These sums, spent outside the ordinary budget, form a part of the capital utilized in an unproductive way in the different European countries as a result of the troubled international situation.

The Consolidated Debt of Switzerland will at the end of 1923 amount to 2.065 millions, the floating debt to 214 million francs. To consolidate a part of the floating debt, the Confederation issued during the second half of November a loan of Frs. 100,000,000 at 5 per cent. at par, for a term of eight years. The subscriptions have reached the sum total of 186 millions. (B. I. S.)
