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SWISS CLUB "SCHWEIZERBUND."

The Annual Dinner of the "Schweizerbund" took place last Friday, March 23rd, at 74, Charlotte Street, W.1, M. Henri Martin, Counsellor of Legation and Commercial Attaché, being in the Chair.

A large company of members and friends sat down to an excellent dinner, served in the large hall of the club, which was specially decorated for the occasion. The loyal toast having been duly honoured, Mr. F. Riederer rose to propose the prosperity of the "Schweizerbund," of which he is the devoted president. He read a letter from the Swiss Minister, expressing sincere regret at not being able, on account of indisposition, to preside over the gathering, as promised. Mr. Riederer traced in a few words the history of the club, the feature of which was the active support and constructive interest, displayed at all times by the members; he would on this occasion refer only to Mr. Isler, their steward, whose capable management was, under present conditions, a great asset.

Mr. F. Burgin, the secretary, had charge of the toast of "The Guests." He extended a hearty welcome to M. Henri Martin, who was accompanied by Mr. Sterchi, the Chancellor of our Legation. The many delegates, sent by the other societies, were ample proof of the intimate relations and good fellowship that existed in the Swiss Colony; he greeted Messrs. Colomb and Audemars (Secours Mutuels), Messrs. Rueff and Senn (City Swiss Club), Messrs. Notari and Biucchi (Unione Ticinese), Messrs. Indermauer and Emmenegger (Union Helvétique), Mr. Jean Baer and Dr. Lang (Nouv. Soc. Helvétique), Mr. and Mrs. Manzoni (Swiss Choral Society), Mr. Lüthi (Gymn. Soc. 'Schweizerbund'); he missed the presence of the President of the Swiss Mercantile Society, who, on account of the sudden illness of Mrs. De Brunner, was detained at the last moment.—Mr. Jean Baer returned thanks on behalf of the visitors.

"La Patrie" was then proposed by M. Henri Martin, who expressed disappointment on being called upon to make a speech, whilst he really anticipated reposing in comfort and enjoying an oration from his distinguished chief. When a previous speaker mentioned 1879 as having witnessed the foundation of their club, it struck him as a lucky omen, as he also was born in that year. M. Martin dwelt upon the present economic conditions in Switzerland and said that we depended in a very large measure upon the traditional friendship and goodwill of England.

To suitably deputize for Mr. F. Isler, whose ladies' toasts are as famous as the tombs of the Pharaohs, would require as many years' practice as the latter are ancient, but Mr. Delaloye acquitted himself of the unheeded task with appropriate spirit and sentiment, with the help of a batch of telegrams which were pouring in from the distant hero in Tunbridge Wells.

The last toast, also proposed by Mr. Delaloye, was to draw the attention of the audience to the founders and honorary members of the club, of whom the following were present: Messrs. Schwarz (the oldest member), Wetter, Dürlewanger, Bernhardt, Bruschweiler, Theo. Nanzler and Riederer.—Mr. Dürlewanger, in his reply, touched a somewhat melancholy note by saying that, although the old flag was still here and kept flying, he saw every year fewer of that small band coming to these festive gatherings.

The enjoyment of the speeches was enhanced by various entertainments, in fact, the speakers themselves contributed greatly to the entertainment by indulging in the recital of proverbial Scotch yarns. The Swiss Choral Society gave a few songs, which, needless to say, were much applauded; Mr. Pestou, the previous conductor, gave an exhibition of his wonderful *basso profundo*, and declamations by Mr. James kept everybody rocking with laughter. Both the dinner and concert were well arranged and expeditiously despatched, with the result that, although the company sat down to dinner fully an hour after the advertised time, the ball commenced sufficiently early to allow those who must catch their last train plenty of time for dancing.
