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approached with a view to finding out what they thought of the idea of having a joint meeting of representatives in order to discuss how best to avoid in the future the constant overlapping of social events which had occurred in the past. SWISS BANK FOOTBALL CLUB.

FIRST ELEVEN.

The 1st XI continue on their winning way and collected another brace of League points on Saturday last at the expense of Ludgate Circus II, gaining a decisive victory by 5 goals to 1. The team has yet to suffer defeat, Saturday's win being the fifth this season, the Bank having played five matches (including two friendly) and winning on each occasion. The goal average makes interesting reading, the Bank forwards having the net on 19 occasions, whilst the defence has only conceded 4 goals.

Saturday was a typical day for football, but the pitch at Preston Road was still very greasy, in spite of the recent spell of fair weather.

The opening period of the game found the Bank team all at sixes and sevens, and for the space of ten minutes it seemed inevitable that the Ludgate Circus team would score, but the Bank defence, although sorely harassed, managed to keep their opponents at bay. Eventually the forwards received the ball and in their usual style swept down the field, and Bornand tested the opposing keeper with a rasping drive that was well saved, but only partially cleared. The ball was fisted to the feet of Dr. Rufer, and this player, working his way to the right, suddenly rammed in a shot from a very acute angle which beat the goalkeeper all ends up. Ten minutes later the same player repeated this performance with a like result, and it must be admitted that these two shots that found the net were the finest that have been witnessed at Preston Road for some time.

This reverse seemed to take the sting out of the attack of the Ludgate Circus team, and the subsequent play was all in favour of the Bank team. The forwards continued to attack, and a corner from Holton resulted in Gourbach netting with a fine header. Shortly afterwards, Bornand, by dint of clever dribbling, beat four opponents, and with a good finishing drive registered the Bank's fourth goal. The opposing team then began to live up, and from the result of a well-timed movement on the part of their forwards the Bank's lead was reduced to 4 goals to 1.

After the resumption the Bank team's superiority was made manifest, and a fifth goal was added by Quaffe, who scored from a corner.

Commenting on the teams, it was obvious that, although the Ludgate Circus team was nippy and clever, the Bank team was sound in every department, and except for the bad spell during the first ten minutes, the team was superior in every respect. Towards the end the game developed into a dour struggle between the Bank forwards and the opposing defence, and on many occasions Dr. Rufer fired in shots only to miss by a narrow margin.

Next week the team will be entertained by Barclays III in the second round of the A.F.A. Minor Cup, on the latter's ground at Ealing.

SECOND ELEVEN.

On Saturday last the Swiss Bank 2nd XI registered their first League victory at the expense of Barclays "C" team, who were beaten by 2 goals to 1.

The game was not particularly enjoyable, and the first half was disheartening, as the Swiss were losing by one goal to nil when breathing time came, and things seemed to point to another strenuous half, fighting with their backs to the wall.

However, matters turned out differently. A certain amount of new life became evident in the Swiss attack, and Barclays' former confidence in an easy victory showed signs of waning. After about a quarter of an hour the due reward came, for, after a particularly determined effort against the opponents' goal, Tobler found the net.

Barclays redoubled their efforts, but things were now different. An occasional goal by their colleagues in the forward string has a heartening effect on the Swiss defence, which beat off the attack with new ardour. After a time the ball went back into Barclays' territory, and there it stopped. With only a few minutes to spare, Tobler again beat the goalkeeper, and the match was won.

Chapot and Hillebrand were rather unlucky, for both hit the framework with rasping shots, which the goalkeeper would never have held if they had been a few inches on the right side. Indeed, many first-class efforts to score were made, and with a little more luck the Swiss victory would have been by a larger margin.

Thus, the optimism which I have expressed in recent articles is justified. Let us hope that last Saturday's victory is only the forerunner of many more to come.
