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Council had adopted "un nouveau règlement consulaire," which would come into force on January 1st, 1924. We quote the following passage, which will interest our colony:—"Il vise essentiellement à une simplification du service consulaire, tout en cherchant à atténuer certaines rigueurs fiscales. L'institution de l'immatriculation, dont l'expérience a démontré l'utilité, est conservée, mais subit, en revanche, une importante modification, en ce sens que l'émolument dû pour la première inscription est réduit de moitié et que la période d'immatriculation s'étend sur trois années civiles; la première période commencera le 1er janvier 1924. Le renouvellement de l'immatriculation s'effectuera, la première fois, le 1er janvier 1927. L'émolument à acquitter pour ce renouvellement sera de 3 fr. Le nouveau règlement élève de deux à cinq ans la durée maximale de la validité des passeports et réduit de 15 à 8 francs le montant de l'émolument dû pour l'établissement de cette pièce. La prolongation annuelle du passeport donnera lieu à la perception d'un émoulement de 5 fr. Le tarif des émoulements, qui fait l'objet d'une ordonnance spéciale annexée au règlement, a été ajusté aux taxes de chancelleries appliquées en Suisse et a subi, de ce fait, quelques réductions fort sensibles."

4. The list of candidates for the Council to be elected at the forthcoming Annual Meeting was drawn up. There will only be fourteen candidates put on the list, so that, unless names should be suggested at the meeting itself, nomination will virtually mean election. Dr. P. LANG, Secretary.
