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Meeting of the Council on Wednesday, April 16th, The Treasurer announced one admission and 1. no resignations.

2. Communications of the Committee:—(a) The Committee heard that the Schweizerische Gesell-schaft für kaufmännisches Bildungswesen had organised a journey to London in July, and Mr. Theo. Weber suggested that the Swiss Colony of London ought to profit by their stay and organise some lectures. The Secretary mentioned that the Commercial Service of the Swiss Legation had taken the necessary steps to enable this party to see all they wanted to see in England. The Gouncil decided to transmit this matter to the Swiss Mercantile Society in consideration of the fact that it is an economic one. (b) Mr. Suter read a letter from the S.S.E. to Mr. Baer which accompanied a few copies of a new pamphlet, issued by this organisation, entitled: "Les Suisses à l'étranger: une oeuvre nationale 1914 à 1924." This pamphlet is an up-to-date resumé of the N.S.H. organisation for Swiss Abroad, and gives, amongst other things, the opinions of many distinguished Swiss people about this work (extracts of letters from Mr. Motta, the late Swiss Minister Dr. Carlin, and so on). The S.S.E. asked the London Group of the N.S.H. to give them their help in the new financial campaign which is being undertaken to assure the maintenance of this "oeuvre susceptible de fortifier la position de notre pays," as Mr. Motta wrote. After some discussion and, in spite of the fact that the Council would have liked to be able to do something in this connection, it was decided that the present condition of our Group would not allow of this. (c) Mr. Baer asked the Council to express its opinion about the term "la quatrième Suise." This term was first used by Mr. de Traz, who wished to find an expression which might represent a symbol and a motto. But during these last moths ther have been several attacks against it, more especially in the Swiss Abroad, but was also an unhappy one, as it seemed to imply division instead of unity. The outcome of the discussion was that the Council voted a resolution to be sent to the S.S.E. ask 2.
