After the two loyal toasts had been proposed and honoured, the Chairman stated that by order the length of speeches had been limited to two minutes, but as they were two hours late, though the dinner was served with exemplary despatch, he was afraid the few speakers would have to submit to a further curtailment. In fact, the remaining two toasts were nothing if not brief, Mr. F. Isler, in speaking of "The Ladies," expressing his inability to do justice to his task in the short space allotted to him.

The tables having been cleared for some preliminary dancing, a large number of the party were marshalled to another part of the building, where a rehearsal was proceeding for the opening of the "Swiss W.E.M.B.L.E." exhibition, an original parody on its great namesake. In the meantime Monsieur Paravicini came over from the Hotel Cecil, where he had been attending an official function; Mr. Stoddon, with some members of his famous orchestra, installed himself on the platform, and presently a town crier, with bell and stentorian voice, announced that the exhibition would now be opened with all the pomp and flourish necessary for the occasion. A little disturbance was caused by a couple of workmen, who, before giving the finishing touches, demanded additional pay, but their grievance was quickly dealt with in a way which, contrary to present dictates, entirely ignored their susceptibilities. Heralded by trumpets, then entered the Oberbürgermeister in cocked hat, wearing a huge chain of office, and accompanied by several frock-coated gents in top hats and white gloves. In a bombastic speech he proclaimed the aims and purpose of the exhibition; they had succeeded in assembling exhibits characteristic of all parts of the Confederation; every canton was suitably represented, in fact, the different cantons had never been brought so close together than that evening. They had surmounted tremendous difficulties, but he regretted to admit that the valuable collection representing the canton of Thurgau had mysteriously disappeared and not yet been recovered. He read out a long list of complimentary cables that had been received for the occasion. A pageant then followed, personifying the 22 cantons, each entry being greeted by the orchestra with the appropriate tune; they assembled in a circle, from which emerged a girl dressed in snowy white, advancing towards Monsieur Paravicini, presenting on a silver tray the golden key with which he was asked to officially open the exhibition. Followed by the Oberbürgermeister and the frock-coated gents, he successfully performed this part of the ceremony, returning with Helvetia, who had been awaiting her release in the exhibition pavilion. Monsieur Paravicini, in a humorous address, thanked the organising committee for their efforts; he had been struck by the variety and originality of the exhibits, and as a memento had been presented with a large onion. The 22 banner-bearers reassembled, and Monsieur Paravicini took the salute as they marched past—thus ending the stately ceremony.

Long applause and bursts of laughter often interrupted this clever burlesque, so originally conceived by Messrs. Wyss and Isler and which Mr. Stoddon's orchestra invested with the necessary pomp and glory. But more than anything else, everybody was struck with the way in which Monsieur Paravicini fulfilled his unexpected and unrehearsed part: he found himself thoroughly at home and seemed to enjoy the joke immensely.

Dancing was indulged in until an early hour of the morning.
