WEEK-END TICKETS TO BELGIUM.

The passport facilities in connection with the issue of week-end tickets to Ostend have been altered, as the result of their abuse by the travelling public. The regulations at present are as

British subjects travelling with the week-end tickets do not require a passport, but they should carry with them some paper by which they can prove their identity.

A similar privilege will be granted to nationals of the following countries: Belgium, Luxembourg, Holland, France, U.S.A., Switzerland, Italy, Spain, Norway, Sweden, Denmark, China, Japan, Uruguay, Cuba and Panama, who carry with them documents to prove that they are authorised to reside in Great Britain (Identity Book).

Passengers of all other nationalities require valid passports, duly vised.

All concerned should note and see that the revised regulations of the Belgians are strictly complied with.
