It was this letter which set me thinking again. Our friend Schaggi is, I think, quite on the right track. Many a critic is too negative, and, what is still worse, many people who would be able to give good and much-needed advice, abstain from so doing. Now, this is what I thought might be a proposal:

There are numerous foreign Correspondents of Swiss papers in London and other towns of the United Kingdom. There are too, as I already said, a good many others who would be able, and I hope willing, to give advice for our people at home and here. If we were to get a committee together of all those people, without much fuss or organisation, who would meet as frequently as would be found necessary, and then and there collect and collate the different experiences and other items, it would enable those who write to the home papers, or the papers in this country, as the case may be, to clear up misunderstandings and to help the inhabitants of both countries. If one or two members of the committee would act as secretaries there would also be a possibility for people at home to write to them direct, or for Institutions of the Swiss Colonies in this country to pass on enquiries.

Please do not misunderstand me. I do not think of a great office, etc. All I think would be necessary is a certain co-operation between those who are able to help in the furtherance of the mutual interests both of our native country and the country of our adoption. There are many things which are better done by the official establishments, but a great deal cannot be done by them which could be done unofficially by others who would be worthy of honour in taking on themselves the duty.

May I mention, before I close this letter, that the Editor and myself are always thankful for suggestions and criticisms any of our Friends may have to make. They need not necessarily be for publication, but if they are, so much the better.

DAS WERK. Verlag von Gebr. Fretz A.G., Zürich.

Das Juhileft dieser schätzenswerten Zeitschrift ist bedeutend durch die Besprechung des Projektes Le Corbusier-Jeanneret für das Völkerbundgebäude in Genf. Dieses muss Aufsehen erregen wegen der neuen Ideen, die in ihm zum Ausdruck kommen. Das Baugelände erfährt durch den Bau keinerlei Veränderung, ruht doch das Gebäude auf Pfeilern von armiertem Beton. So wird unter den Bau hindurch die Aussicht auf den See und das linksufrige herrliche Hügelland erhalten.

Einen durchaus günstigen Eindruck macht auch das "Farbige Zürich." Dem Text sind zwei farbige Tafeln beigegeben betitelt: Vorschlag für die Bemalung der Altstadt Zürich. (Der Münsterhof und die Stüsslihöfstatt). Bemalung von Augusto Giacometti und Giuseppe Scartezzini, die des Reizes nicht entbehrt.

Das Juhileft. Die Schweiz kann sich rühmen, in dem grossen Wettbewerb für den Neubau des Völkerbundes nicht nur das beste Projekt (von Le Corbusier), sondern auch das modernste von den zwei jungen Basler Architekten Hannes Meyer und Hans Wittwer beigesteuert zu haben. Das Juhileft bringt das Projekt Meyer-Wittwer zur Darstellung. Aus den übrigen Publikationen ist weiterhin beachtenswert die Veröffentlichung des *neuen Goetheanum* in Dornach, ein Aufsatz über die Arbeiten des Pariser Architekten Mallet-Stevens, ferner die Widmung Heinrich Wölflins zu Liebermanns 80. Geburtstag, Ausführungen über die Gemälde von Otto Morach und die Plastiken von Arnold Hünawadel und neuere Arbeiten für Innenausstattung von Otto Zollinger, Zürich-Saarbrücken. Im Anhang wird auf die eben erfolgte Eröffnung der grossen Werkbundausstellung "Die Wohnung" hingewiesen.

Aus dem Inhalt der *Augustnummer* erwähnen wir: Es ist ein Sonderheft.—Das gute Industrieprodukt.—Der Völkerbundswettbewerb.—Augusto Giacometti zum 50. Geburtstag. Wir können unseren Lesern, besonders Architekten und Ingenieuren, aber auch solchen die ein Interesse für das Kunstgewerbe haben, nur wärmstens empfehlen.

CORRESPONDENCE.

To the Editor of the *Swiss Observer*.

DEAR SIR,—The author of the article quoted under "Notes and Gleanings" in No. 311 of the *Swiss Observer* gives indeed an "unduly depressing picture" of the Swiss Protestant Church. As everywhere in Protestant countries Church attendance has diminished, this is no longer the only barometer for the religious life of a Protestant country. The judgment must be that of an outsider. In the inner living circles of Swiss Protestantism one would be much astonished to hear that it is moribund. It is not; and the author has said no truer thing than that he is not an expert. We believe even that Swiss Protestantism has discovered a new life and the author would know it if he would not merely consult some of his young friends, but also some of longer experience and riper judgment. Youth everywhere to-day has not the best contact with the Church, but I do not think they are worse or more indifferent in Switzerland than elsewhere.
