In points the Swiss Rifle Association has won the competition, but the mode of reckoning the two totally different events together does not appear to us to be quite equitable, and we wish to express here our appreciation of the sporting way in which our English friends gave in to the point of view—not well-considered, we believe—put forward by the members of the Swiss team.

As regards the shooting, the Swiss team exhibited some nervousness, none of them coming anywhere near his usual form on the 100 yds. target; even Wetter, who only a fortnight ago shot

14 consecutive bulls, could not get beyond 93. The birds had a good time, only 46 out of 120 being killed; our members took far too long an aim and allowed the birds to get away out of reach. Arn. Schmid managed to shoot down just half of his birds with Devincenzi, who at the last moment had taken Lampert's place, a good second. Our English friends scored three possible (Grierson, O'Leary and Pocock) and the highest combined points were secured by Pocock with 195 and Grosvenor with 194, followed on the Swiss side by Wetter with 192.
