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ELECTRIC POWER IN SWITZERLAND.

The latest statistics relating to the develop-ment of hydro-power in Switzerland, recently published by the Swiss Association for the Devel-opment of Water Power show that Switzerland is one of the most highly electrified countries in the world. The rate of development has been particularly rapid during the last two decades, as is shown by the following tabular statement, which includes works with installed plant ex-ceeding 500 h.p.:—

1921-1928 ... 743,000 92,900 Plant to the extent of 478,000 h.p. was in course of construction at the end of last year, and it is anticipated that the average annual increase for the period 1921-1930 will work out at approxi-mately 122,000 h.p. Only 5,000 h.p. were com-pleted during 1928, including the Trient hydro-electric station of the Federal Railways, but work was proceeding on no fewer than eight power stations, which when completed will bring the to 2,620,000 h.p. Moreover, a number of schemes are being elaborated for the erection of further power stations in the near future, the rating of which is put at some 730,000 h.p. The power consumption represented an aver-age of 1,070kw. hours per head of the entire popu-lation, compared with 907kw. hours in 1927, exports being excluded in both cases.

NATIONALITY OF MARRIED WOMEN.

The Conference of the International Federa-tion of University Women, which this year has been held at Geneva, has been discussing this vexed question, and by a large majority passed a resolution supporting the demand that a woman should have the same right as a man to retain or change her nationality. Thirty-four nations were represented at the Congress. The last war showed how vital a matter declaration of nationality might prove to many women, and several curious cases were brought to light of women mar-ried to husbands of non-British origin, who were placed in awkward predicaments, although they were widows, or had been deserted by their husbands many years before. The University women urged that the principle shoud be incor-porated in the Convention to be prepared by the first Conference under the League of Nations for the Conference under the League of Nations for the Codification of International Law, which is to meet at the Hague, probably next year. The question was discussed at the Imperial Con-ference in 1926, and British and Australian Parquestion was unscassed at the Imperial Con-ference in 1926, and British and Australian Par-liaments have unanimously adopted resolutions in favour of ae woman retaining her nationality on marriage with an alien, unless she expressly makes a declaration that she is desirous of adopt-ing that of her husband. The Preparatory Com-mittee at its recent meeting in Madrid proposed that the sessions of the Nationality Committee should be held in private, but the International Women's Organisations are opposed to this, and are sending resolutions of protest to their respec-tive Governments. Much comment has been caused in the Press by the fact that woman law-yers of France, Holland, Spain, and Switzerland were opposed to the resolution at the University Women's Conference, but their opposition was over-ruled, and had not the support of other pro-fessional women even from their own countries.


