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for a night only, but they are all without exception worthy of a visit of longer duration.

Two at least do get very full appreciation—Lausanne and Geneva. The reasons for this are not applicable to such places as Basle and Zürich. Lausanne has for over a century had a large English colony (residential and educational as well as touristic), and Geneva, as the seat of the League of Nations, the Red Cross, the International Labour Office and other things, naturally appeals to a very large cosmopolitan throng.

Geneva, like Lausanne, is also much frequented by tourists, as it is one of the main entrances to the Mont Blanc country. It is certainly one of the most beautiful towns in the world.

The largest of the Swiss cities is Zürich, which is the chief centre of the silk industry, but also an interesting place of call for visitors to the Engadine. This is not only because it houses the Swiss National Museum, but because of the many other features of interest for the tourist—boating, bathing, golf and tennis.

The next biggest city is Basle, the ancient Basilea or royal residence of Roman times. As the most important entrance into Switzerland from the north, and occupying a position in the very middle of Europe, it is a favourite place of call, and most visitors who spend a night or so there make a point of visiting its minster and the Bücklin room in its picture gallery.

Geneva is a busy commercial centre as well as a tourist resort adjoining the numerous mountain centres of the Haute Savoie.

It has also a most interesting history, and is well to the fore as a centre of international conferences.

For the tourist it has many delightful excursions, good boating and sailing, golf, tennis, and most other things that tourists like. As a town it may be compared with Paris on a much smaller scale.

Berne, the capital of Switzerland and the chief town in the most thickly populated canton, has many important industries (machinery, chocolate, agriculture, etc.).

The town contains much interesting domestic architecture of the eighteenth century period and several street fountains.

Its numerous passing visitors *en route* to or from the magnificent scenery of the Oberland usually have time to enjoy the extensive Alpine panorama from the Kleine Schanze, to wander through some of its quaint arched streets and cross the Nydeck Bridge to the Bears' Den.

Lausanne attracts many English people at all seasons, as it has a wide reputation as an education centre. It is also a residential town with a large foreign colony which has been much increased since the opening of the Simplon and the through daily expresses between Calais and Constantinople.

Of the smaller cities of Switzerland mention may be made of St. Gall, with a big linen and embroidery trade, and Coire, the junction for the Engadine resorts.

Also there are Lucerne, the principal tourist centre of the country; Neuchâtel, with chocolate factories and a watch-making industry; Vevey, in the wine country between Montreux and Lausanne, and famous for its milk and chocolate factories; and the two Italian-Swiss towns of Lugano and Locarno, both mainly interested in tourism.

ALDO GENONI.

The sad news of the death of Aldo Genoni reached me early this week. Although not widely known among the Swiss in general the Ticinese Colony loses a patriot and the Unione Ticinese a very valuable Honorary Member. It has been my privilege to know him intimately and more than once I have had occasion to verify his generosity. Very many patriotic appeals were responded to most generously by him and never have I known him to decline an appeal. A real, good and true Swiss has thus departed.

Aldo Genoni died on the 29th June last at his Villa Marza in Massagno near Lugano at the comparatively early age of 60. Thirty-seven years ago he founded, in George Street, Plymouth, a restaurant bearing his name. Perseverance and his untiring energy made this establishment one of the best-known in Plymouth. But long years of assiduous work left its mark upon his health which was consequently somewhat shaken. About 6 months ago he decided to give up his business and return for good to his beloved Switzerland to enjoy a well earned rest. Alas! fate decided otherwise and his family and friends mourn him.
