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FEDERAL.

THE COST OF LIVING.

The index figure of the cost of living according to the Federal Department for Industry, Trade and Labour is the same as in the previous month : 158 (June 1914—100), as compared with 161 at the end of June 1929. In opposition to this slight decrease is to be considered a slight increase in the cost of foodstuffs caused through the change from old to new potatoes. The index figure for foodstuffs is at the end of June 1930 151 compared with 150 at the end of May 1930 and end of June 1929.

NEW EGG-MARKING ORDER.

The Federal Council decided on several changes in the regulations for foodstuffs. As regards the stamping of eggs it was decreed that the cases from abroad must be marked "Import" or must show the place of origin. If cases once are opened the seller has to mark each egg with a stamp "Imp." if they are not already marked with the stamp of the place of origin. Through this the stamping at the frontier falls away so as not to increase the price and also to avoid delay. This stamping is to come into force on Nov. 1st.

To complete this order home produced eggs are also to be marked with a particular stamp.

LOCAL. ZURICH.

The 50-year-old Mrs. Willimann lost her life in consequence of an unfortunate accident which occurred last Sunday in a restaurant at the Braunerstrasse. An old muzzle loading pistol which was stolen by a party of motorists in the Canton of Baselland was shown round and the trigger was pulled many times, without anything happening. The proprietor of the restaurant then put it away. In the evening the same party came back and one of them asked for the pistol back, as he would like to show it to some friends. Again several times the trigger was pulled, but when it reached the hands of a young chauffeur Willi Hofstetter who also manipulated the trigger a shot rang out and hit Mrs. Willimann in the head causing her immediate death. N.Z.

BERNE.

The Organising Committee of the Zuka in Zurich (the international cookery exhibition) addressed on March 27th two months previous to the opening date, a request to the Executive Council of Berne for permission to sell Tombola Tickets also in the canton of Berne. Now, three weeks after the closing of the exhibition, there arrives a reply from the Bernese Police Department dated 17th of July, in which this Department informs the Committee that this request cannot be dealt with as it was not stamped. Should the Committee require that the application should go forward to the Executive Council, it would have to send 1.80 Frs. in stamps. This is referring to the Tombola which was drawn on June 28th.

After having tried in several parts of Central Switzerland it was decided to come to Lissach and the following proposition was submitted to the District Council. The Commune of Sissach has to bear half of the cost of the building land which amounts to 22,000 Frs. (2.50 Frs. per square metre). This amount is guaranteed to the commune in that it has to be paid back when Fortuna sells the property within 10 years or closes down the works. This proposal was unanimously accepted by the inhabitants, as it also contains a clause that the trades people of Sissach should have first consideration in the construction of the works and that in the employment of workers natives should have preference. N.Z.
