SWISS MERCANTILE SOCIETY.

The Ordinary Monthly Meeting was held at Swiss House on Wednesday, November 12th, with Mr M. Paschoud, the President of the Society, in the Chair.

The President read a letter from Mr. Green, C.A., the Society's newly appointed auditor, in which he suggested the introduction of a new set of books and the amalgamation of certain funds. The suggestions were approved unanimously. The President also imparted to the members the contents of a letter received from the *Swiss Observer*. This well-known periodical, which has found its way into almost every Swiss home in the United Kingdom, is shortly celebrating its 10th anniversary, on which occasion a special number will be issued. It was decided to accept with thanks some space in the special number where reference will be made of the activities of the S.M.S.

The President then read out the names of various members who were considerably in arrears with their contributions. In view of the shortly forthcoming registration of the Society it was decided to make a last appeal to the members concerned and in case of non-compliance to resort reluctantly to the only remaining alternative, i.e., to strike them off. It was also suggested to induce the members generally by circular letter to make a special effort to settle outstanding contributions so as to give the new Society a clean start.

Mr. H. C. Meili referred to a letter which appeared in the last issue of the *Swiss Observer* and in which certain statements regarding the College of the S.M.S. were made. Mr. Meili read out a personal answer refuting insinuations in this letter. As the former letter was not officially addressed to the S.M.S. it was decided not to answer officially but to leave it to individuals to reply. Should it, however, lead up to a polemic it would then be necessary to answer officially.

The President, Mr. Paschoud, thereupon broached the subject of new premises. In order to guide the members in their decision whether to agree in principle to such a scheme, the President submitted a sketch, plans and estimates of the proposed new premises. These plans had been kindly drawn up by an old friend of the S.M.S., Mr. Th. Schaefer, F.R.I.B.A., A.I.Struct.E., Architect, who is fully conversant with the aims and needs of the S.M.S. and had given professional advice on several occasions in connection with Swiss House. Mr. Paschoud in a very fit and able speech pointed out the necessity and practicability of the scheme. He said that in view of the national work the Society is carrying on, we should be able to raise the necessary funds. A lengthy discussion ensued and it was finally decided to depute two members to try to raise the necessary capital of approximately £40,000 in Switzerland. It was also suggested that in case the project could be realised that a Proprietary Company should be formed so as not to place too heavy a burden on the London Section.

A letter had been received from the Central Society purporting a visit to London in 1931 by a contingent of members and asking for the Society's co-operation and collaboration in the organisation of this plan. The matter was referred to the Committee.

The President had a very unpleasant task to fulfil, namely to inform the members of the resignation of Mr. W. Deutsch as Chairman of the Education Committee. It is regretted that this most important office was wrenched from Mr. Deutsch after such a short tenure for reasons of health. Mr. Deutsch's resignation was due to nervous strain and he acted on the advice of his doctor. Mr. Deutsch has devoted all his energy to the very responsible position. He liked the work which was eased through the loyalty and co-operation of both the teaching and clerical staff. The President thanked Mr. Deutsch on behalf of the Society for his magnanimous services and wished him a speedy recovery.

An old friend of the S.M.S. stepped into the breach and accepted the Chairmanship of the Education Committee. As on other occasions Mr. A. C. Stahelin has shown that "a friend in need is a friend indeed."

Before the close of the meeting, Mr. W. L. Krucker, Vice-President, gave a concise report of the last Cinderella Dance and drew the members' attention to the forthcoming Fancy Dress Ball at the Midland Grand Hotel, on January 3rd, 1931.
