A PROSPEROUS BENEVOLENT SOCIETY.

The Swiss Benevolent Society in Rome cele-brated a few days ago the hundredth anniversary of its foundation. Originally established for the purpose of supporting necessitous families of retired or deceased Swiss Papal Guards its activities gradually extended. According to the report for 1929 the Society possesses funds amounting to about 200,000 Lire; whilst the revenue derived from interest and individual con-tributions reached about 21,000 Lire, the moneys spent on relieving needy Swiss does not exceed 11,000 Lire.
