## SWISS MERCANTILE SOCIETY LIMITED.

The President now had a very pleasant duty to perform. Mr. J. Pfander, who after 25 years faithful and unselfish services had decided to take a well deserved rest from Committee work, was presented with a gold watch bearing a suitable inscription of the Society's mark of gratitude.

Mrs. Pfander, who had to spare her husband on so many occasions when engaged at long Committee Meetings, was presented with a bouquet. Another faithful member of the Society, Mr. O. Grob, who has been a Committee Member for some years and by his wise economy strengthened the once so sadly depleted coffers, has lately joined those men who find bachelorhood a boredom. ## SWISS CHERRIES ON THE LONDON MARKET.

Our readers will be interested to hear that considerable quantities of Swiss Cherries (caroons) are sold on the London market. They are sent from the north-east part of Switzerland (chiefly Basel-Land) in daily consignments of five to six tons, and on account of their superior quality command higher prices than the English fruit. Generally speaking the importation of foreign cherries (French and Italian) has been prohibited, they being affected by a disease (cherry fly); the consignments from Switzerland are regularly inspected by an official from the Ministry of Agriculture and have without exception been found to be perfectly sound.

This is the first time that Swiss cherries have been sold over here in large quantities. The distribution is being handled by our compatriot, Mr. T. Surer of 37, King Street, Covent Garden, W.C.2, who will be pleased to supply original baskets (about 15 lbs.) at current prices.
