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FEDERAL.

MITTELHOLZER LANDS AT DUEBENDORF.

Mittelholzer, the famous Swiss aviator, has returned from his long distance flight to Africa and back. A large number of spectators assembled at the Aerodrome to welcome the aviator and his companions.

PURCHASE OF A HODLER PICTURE.

The Federal Council has sanctioned the purchase of a picture by Ferdinand Hodler, the eminent Swiss painter, through the Gottfried Keller Foundation. The purchase price of the picture (Der bewunderte Jüngling) was 31,600 francs. The Zurich Art Society has contributed an amount of 14,000 frs. towards the costs, and the work will be given to the Zürcher Kunsthaus on loan.

NEW CUSTOMS BUILDING.

The Federal Council has voted a credit of 12,000 francs for acquiring the necessary land to erect a new customs house at Riehen.

SWISS BANK REPORTS.

The net profits of the Crédit Suisse for 1930 amounted to 16,419,000fr., against 18,589,000fr. for 1929. The dividend remains unchanged at 8 per cent. Union Financière de Gêveva earned a net profit of 4,049,000 for 1930, against 5,369,000fr. for 1929. The dividend has been passed, and the profits will be used for writing off capital depreciation. Last year's dividend was 8 per cent. The net earnings of the Freiburger Staatsbank amounted to 2,585,000fr. for 1930, practically unchanged as compared with the previous year.

PROFITS OF SWISS POST & TELEPHONE &

TELEGRAPH ADMINISTRATION.

The receipts for 1930 of the Swiss Postal Administration amounts to 149.19 million francs and the expenditure to 130.39 million francs. The net profit will be about 10 million francs. Telegraph and telephone administration: The following are the figures for the year ending 1930: Receipts, 81.3 million francs. Expenditure: 44.13 million francs. The net profit is estimated at 1.2 million francs.

NEW MORTGAGE BANK.

A new international mortgage bank is being established at Basle under the auspices of the Deutsche Central-Boden-Credit A.G. Its capital will be 50 million francs.

BERNE.

A happy event took place at the bear pit in Berne, five little bear children have arrived and it is reported, that both mother and children are doing well. That brings the inhabitants of the pit to the number of sixteen.

The catering firm Gfeller-Rindlisbacher in Berne, which has branches at Basel and Zurich has offered to give free luncheons to fifty unemployed during one month. The authorities have accepted this offer with thanks. This firm has on numerous occasions given proof of their great generosity.

The death is reported of M. Ryff, President of the Board of the Strickwarenfabrik Ryff & Co. A. G. in Berne at the age of 67. M. Ryff was also the founder of the West African firm Ryff, Roth & Co. in Sherbro. N.Z.

An interesting educational experiment has been started at Langnau, in the famous Emmental cheese producing district.

This is a domestic training school for boys, the aim being to equip the pupils with sufficient knowledge of domestic matters as shall enable

them to help their mothers, or later, their wives in the management of the household.

The boys are taught the elements of cookery, laundry work, plain sewing, etc. After completing the course they will be able to cook a dinner, darn their own socks, sew on their own buttons, wash their own shirts, and generally render themselves independent of feminine assistance in these functions of domestic life.

The new school was an instantaneous success, and on the opening day no less than 112 boys were admitted to the register. After some experience with this experimental school others will probably be opened on the same lines.

A party of 12 men from Adelboden set out to-day to search for the bodies of the three British women and the Swiss guide who were killed in the avalanche disaster last Friday. A member of the Brigue branch of the Swiss Alpine Club is with them and other local men and hotel employees at Riederalp have also joined them.

It was hoped that the search party would return late this afternoon.

The woman victims of the disaster were Miss Dorothy Furnivall, a London lawn tennis player, her mother, and Miss Leslie Galloway, daughter of Colonel F. L. Galloway, once Director of the Ministry of Munitions. They were overwhelmed by an avalanche while out skiing.

Two skiers were killed yesterday, one on the heights near Neuenegg and the other on the Vogelberg.

Major Ruchti, a veterinary, sustained a fatal fall while training for a forthcoming skiing competition and succumbed almost immediately to his injuries. He was expert in all Alpine sports.

A skier, M. Emile Weber, of Basle, while descending the Vogelberg struck a rock and broke his backbone. Death was instantaneous. The body has been recovered.

Flight-Lieutenant Waghorn, the Schneider Trophy winner, yesterday won the Yamato skiing challenge cup at Grindelwald in 11m. 27.8s.
