LECTURE OF ENGINEER HUG.

On Friday, March 6th, a most interesting lecture on the Electrification in the Dutch East Indies was given by our compatriot, Engineer Hug, at the Institution of Mechanical Engineers, Storeys Gate, W.1.

Before closing the meeting, the Chairman thanked Engineer Hug on behalf of the Institution for this highly interesting lecture, voicing the wish that the members may have another opportunity to hear the lecturer.

We wish to put it on record, that apart from the 60 Englishmen who honoured our distinguished countryman, a total number of five only of his compatriots found it worth while to attend, surely not a very brilliant record.

PROF. BRUNNER AT KING'S COLLEGE.

Prof. Dr. Emil Brunner, the well-known theologian of the Zurich University, whose religious conceptions and teaching have a great repercussion in Switzerland, Germany and other countries, has been asked by King's College, London, to give a course of five lectures under the subject: "The Word and the World."

Our distinguished compatriot spoke last week successively in English about "The Word of God and Reason," "The Word of Christ and History," "The Word of the Spirit and Psychology," "The Word of the Bible and Science," "The Word of the Church and Society." The lectures attracted each time larger audiences amongst which many distinguished English personalities. It has been heard from various sides that the affirmative and vigorous doctrine of this leader of a new and powerful movement has had a large repercussion in British circles.

The Swiss Minister, Monsieur C. R. Paravicini, who was present at one of the lectures, entertained on Saturday last, Prof. Brunner at luncheon at 21, Bryanston Square.

Amongst the other guests were present: Dr. R. Elton, Professor of King's College; The Rev. A. E. Simms, Rector of St. Mary's, Bryanston Square; Pastor Wehrhan, of the German Church in London; Pasteur Hahn, of the Schweizerkirche, London; Pasteur Pradervand, suffragant, de l'Eglise Suisse de Londres; M. L. Micheli, ler Secrétaire de Légation.

Viscount Brentford and Pasteur Hoffmann-de-Visme were unfortunately unable to be present; the latter had left for Liverpool to attend the Swiss Fête there on Saturday night, and preach on Sunday.
