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FEDERAL.

SWITZERLAND AND GOLD STANDARD.

According to the reports published in the English Press, Switzerland is supposed to be on the eve of suspending the gold standard. These reports are entirely without foundation. The official policy has not changed, and is not likely to change. Although it is true that conditions are bad, there is nothing in the situation which would indicate that Switzerland may be driven off the gold standard. There is no sign of any material withdrawal of foreign funds from Switzerland. Though it is true that a few months ago the temporary revival of confidence resulted in some repatriations, this movement has since ceased. In the Foreign Exchange market the rumours were not taken seriously, and forward Swiss francs are still quoted at a slight premium.

No country has ever deliberately abandoned the gold standard unless it was forced off it by adverse circumstances. There is no reason why the Swiss Government should create a precedent in this respect, and there are many reasons why it should not do so. Apart from any other reasons, the relative importance of foreign balances in the country's economic life is much larger in Switzerland than in any other country, so that it is extremely unlikely that any Swiss Government would deliberately take a step the result of which would be the wholesale withdrawal of these balances.

SWISS BANKER AND EUROPEAN COMMISSION.

The Committee set up on the advice of the European Commission to consider the guarantee fund recommended by the Stresa Conference met in Geneva. Herr Gottlieb Bachmann, president of the Swiss National Bank, was elected chairman.

RUSSO-SWISS BARTER TRADE.

A barter arrangement has been entered into between the Swiss Union of Cheese Exporters and Soviet Russia in respect of the exchange of fifty truckloads of cheese for Soviet benzine and anthracite.

The whole question of the commercial relations between Switzerland and the Soviet is shortly to be examined by a special committee of the Swiss Federal Council, under the chairmanship of the Swiss President, M. Motta. Representatives of the Swiss Federation of Engineering Industries will participate in the discussions.

SWISS BUDGET 1933.

The Swiss Budget for 1933 shows a deficit of £2,820,000, the receipts being estimated at £14,840,000 and expenditure at £17,660,000. The Finance Minister has proposed an increase of duty on petrol.

M. DINICHERT IN BERLIN.

Monsieur Paul Dinichert, the newly appointed Swiss Minister, has presented his credentials to President von Hindenburg.

LOCAL.

ZURICH.

Dr. Hans Steiner, Director of the Zoological Garden in Zurich, has retired from his post which he has held since 1925; he was an untiring worker for this institution, and his departure means a great loss for the town of Zurich.

Pastor Carl Arbenz has died in Wiedikon at the age of 59; he was for nearly 20 years connected with the community of Wiedikon where he enjoyed a great reputation.

From Zollikon comes the news of the death of M. Arnold Stahel-Mousson at the age of 69; he was a cotton manufacturer, and his business was one of the leading ones in Switzerland.

BERNE.

Professor Julius Mai, of the Berne University, one of the most noted chemists in Switzerland, has celebrated his seventieth birthday. Professor Mai is also well-known as a composer of operas and as the Choirmaster of the Berne Synagogue.

M. Naegeli-Staehli, one of the best known Bernese Alpine guides, has died at the age of 66 years.

The Federal Jodler competition will take place at Interlaken on Saturday and Sunday the 17/18th of June, 1933.

The canton of Bern suffers from a scarcity of clergymen, and many posts are vacant.

Professor Dr. Oscar von Allmen of the University of Berne has died suddenly at the age of 34. Professor von Allmen was one of the youngest University Professors in Switzerland.

The Government of the canton of Berne proposed to the Grand Council an increase of 10 per cent. in income tax.

Rud. Schoch who made an attempt last June to shoot Federal Counsellor Musy, has been found to be insane, being a native of St. Gall he will be interned in an asylum of the canton of St. Gall.

Ingenieur Vaterlaus, Manager of the Hasler A.G. in Berne and his wife, who were on their honeymoon, were the victims of a fatal accident, they were motoring from Rome to Terni when they collided at a level crossing with a train. Both were killed instantly.

BASLE.

Lieutenant Paul Böttcher, pilot of the military aerodrome Basel-Biosfelden, was severely injured when his machine crashed into a field near Augst.

FRIBOURG.

M. Bertrand Schnetz, for many years editor of the "Démocrate" in Delsberg has died at the age of 58.

GENEVA.

The death is reported from Geneva of M. Maurice Turrettini, a noted Swiss architect; many of the principal buildings at Geneva, such as the "Crédit Suisse," etc., were built after his plans.

VAUD.

Dr. Becker of Lausanne has been appointed Professor of surgery at the University of Lausanne in succession to the late Professor Henri Vulliet.

INTERNATIONALS.

The last game in the "Europa Cup" was settled on 28th October in Prague, when Czechoslovakia defeated Italy by 2 goals to 1. Thereby Austria became winners of this competition.

In Budapest, Hungary beat Germany by 2:1.
